Under the technical expertise of Webmeister **Jim Maloney**, the home page continues to be an integral and vital part of the **Association**'s line of communications. It is where one can keep informed

between newsletters, and where news is reported and updated in a real-time manner.

Plus, it provides members a forum to keep in touch, learn about current and ongoing **Association** activities, and reference previous projects and/or events.



An increasingly important function is that our internet link to the world provides former 55th warriors a means to reconnect. It is not uncommon for past 55th SRW/55th Wing members, or friends and families, to find

HALL OF FAME

55th WING HERITAGE WEEK

In March 2010 Association President Thomas proposed to the then 55th Wing Commander, BGen John Shanahan, that some wing units hold a series of events during the week leading up to the 55th Wing Birthday Ball to commemorate the history and legacy of the *Fightin' Fifty-Fifth*. The general readily embraced the idea, issued a wing-wide "Shanagram" and another tradition was born.

Continuing that commitment, this year from 26-31 March, Heritage Week was celebrated and highlighted by such functions as the Ops Group Commander's Conference, the Wing Commander's Conference, gatherings at the 38th, 338th and 343rd squadrons, culminating with the Hall of Fame ceremony, the *Tales of the 55th*, and the main event, the 34th annual Wing Birthday Ball.

Current **55th** commander **BGen Donald Bacon** stated, "*The Fightin' Fifty-Fifth* has a rich heritage of exceptional achievement and proven performance going back 71 years. This week celebrates where we have been and the importance of our history as we continue into the future."

"Our wing has over seven decades of producing heroes, and *(this week)* provides them an opportunity to congregate back at their home wing," General Bacon concluded.

Pres Thomas added, "The **Association** is a partner of the Wing, with nearly 700 members worldwide, former and current members of the Wing. Their role is to assist the Wing in numerous ways, one of which is to help keep the **55**th storied history alive by supporting events such as Heritage Week."

The functions at the operational squadrons of today allow the seasoned crewdogs to return and mingle with the current generation of the *Fightin' Fifty-Fifth*.

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TALES OF THE 55TH

The thirteenth edition was held **Friday**, **30 March**, in the CMSAF James M. McCoy Airmen Leadership School with Association President Thomas emceeing. At 1630, after the sounding of the **55th** Ceremonial Bell by **Arlen Howe**, Robb Hoover and BGen Bacon, the general made opening remarks. Thomas followed with a report on the various monuments to the WWII **55th** Fighter Group history in the UK and at **55th** Wing HQ.

A Cold War Tribute to the **55th** video was shown. It was compiled for the 2010 Birthday Ball at the behest of BGen Shanahan, then the wing commander, by Hoover and Moore, narrated by **Dave Webber**, with the expert technical assistance of **55th** Wing Audio Visual specialist **Kevin Schwandt**. That video can be viewed on the **Association** web site.

Moore followed the video with a Cold War tale of the 17 November 1970 incident over the Pachora Sea north of Murmansk, when Soviet MiG-17s fired warning shots in the vicinity of a **55th** special project aircraft performing a CIA driven surveillance mission.

Captain Chris Shannon, 45th Recon Sqd, shared his story of North Korean MiG 29s surprising intercept of a COBRA BALL mission aircraft over the Sea of Japan in 2010. Shannon is a second generation **55ther**, his dad being **Mike**, a former 1ACCS commander.

Also of the 45th, navigator **Capt Mark Cramer** told of his experience with WC-135 response missions to Japan's March 2011 earthquake and tsunami. He detailed the process before and after of putting aircraft and crew in a radiation hot zone.

The event is co-sponsored by the **Association**; the Lemay Flight, Order of Dadaelians; and the Strategic Roost of the Association of Old Crows.

Attendance grows every year as most of the wing's senior staff, and an eclectic group of active duty troops, retirees, families, and assorted visitors in town for the Ball fill the venue.

* * * * * * ANNUAL 55th WING BIRTHDAY BALL

The **55th Wing** held its 34th annual Birthday Ball, **Saturday, March 31, 2012** at the Embassy Suites Convention Center in LaVista. The gala event is open to all active duty ranks and civilian members of the wing, retirees, and by invitation to local dignitaries.

The Ball celebrated the 71th anniversary of the unit from its roots in the activation of the 55th Pursuit Group at Hamilton Field, CA, in January 1941, during World War II.



The Ball is the Wing's largest annual formal social function. This year 970 people attended, an all time high, including many alumni and Association members. The event was hosted by Brigadier General Donald Bacon, 55th Wing Commander, and his wife, Angela.

This year's theme, "Three Generations of Integrity, Excellence, Service", recognized the storied history of the Wing, and the men and women who performed, and continue to execute, the many and varied missions the Wing operates worldwide in peacetime and in the war on terrorism.

Captain Stan Montoya of the **55th** Strategic Communications Squadron led the Ball Committee made up of personnel from a cross-section of the Wing's units. **Captain Megan Kessen** of the 45th RS was the vice chairman.

Max Moore and Bill Ernst represented the **Association** on the committee as senior advisors. The **Association** donates \$1000 every year to help defray the costs for younger airmen to attend the event.

BGen Bacon expressed his sincere appreciation to the **Association** membership for its generosity in assisting the Ball effort.

General Ronald R. Fogleman (USAF Retired) accompanied by his delightful wife, Miss Jayne, was this year's guest speaker. General Fogleman served as Air Force Chief of Staff from October 1994 thru August 1997 when he retired. He knew his audience, his subject and had a commanding presence. The attendees were rapt during his talk.

LeMay Center for Doctrine Development and Education, and Vice Commander, Air University, Maxwell Air Force Base, AL, (both of whom are 55th alumni). Congressmen Lee Terry and Jeff Fortenberry (both R-Neb) and their wives; the sixth ChiefMSgt of the AF, James McCoy and his wife Kathy; Bellevue Mayor Rita Sanders: Nebraska State Senators Bob Krist and wife Peg, and Scott and Mrs Price, plus a cadre of RAF officers and enlisted crew members who are undergoing training in the RC-135 with the 338th Combat Training Squadron.

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AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE

MSgt Dennis W. Carr, Deputy Flight Chief, Civil Engineering Support, **55th** Contracting Sqd is the 2012 winner of the **55th Wing Association** Award for Excellence. The award was announced at the **55th** Wing Birthday Ball by President Thomas.

MSgt Carr had previously been selected as the **55th** Wing Senior NCO of the Year for 2011, and as the Air Combat Command, Outstanding Contracting Senior NCO of the Year.

He served a six month deployment to Afghanistan in 2011 as the NATO Forces Chief Contractor. His superior performance was recognized by **Army General David Patraeus**, Commander, US Forces Afghanistan, and a NATO foreign ambassador. He also was awarded a Bronze Star for his outstanding support to NATO forces.

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FIGHTIN' FIFTY-FIFTH EARNS OMAHA TROPHY

For the second time in three years, US Strategic Command awarded the Omaha Trophy to the **55th Wing** signifying the unit as the best strategic aircraft operations wing.

General C. Robert Kehler, STRATCOM commander, recently made the announcement of the award, which goes to the organization demonstrating the highest performance standards within the Command's mission areas.

Selection was based upon formal evaluations, meritorious achievement, safety, and other factors, such as: community involvement and humanitarian actions.

The Omaha Trophy is presented by the Strategic Command Consultation Committee, a local civilian organization that supports Team Offutt, and whose linage dates back to Strategic Air Command and **General Curtis E. LeMay**.

"Winning the Omaha Trophy is a great honor for the **55th Wing**," said BGen Bacon, the **55th** Commander, "and I thank General Kehler, USSTRATCOM, and the consultation committee for recognizing our airmen."

"We had a historic year in 2011, and supporting USSTRATCOM's mission is one of the most important mission sets we have," Bacon continued.

"The fact that this trophy also reflects the great support we have from our local community makes it even more meaningful." Bacon added, "This community sets the standard throughout the Department of Defense and we are blessed to call it home."

If you wish to buy a brick, or know of anyone who wants one, now is the time to place an order.

The cost is **\$65 for per brick**, and the engraving is **limited** to three lines, 13 characters per line including spaces, dashes and slashes (**No periods**,

commas, colons or semicolons or quotation marks.

We need your orders before 1 August this year to plan for getting the bricks engraved and painted before winter sets in, if possible.



AN ACTIVE DUTY PERSPECTIVE By LtCol Mohan Krishna

LtCol Krishna, serves as an active duty member of the Association's Board of Directors. A Maryland native, a graduate of the USAF Academy, and a former 343rd RS EWO and commander, he is in his fourth assignment with the 55th, currently as the Deputy Commander, Mission Support Group.



A VIEW FROM THE FRONT LINES

As with most wings, the 55^{th} is gearing up for a summer of change with the Wg/CC and CV, the OG/CC and the MDG/CC all changing out along with numerous squadron commanders.

The great thing about our wing is that change in leadership usually doesn't mean a change in operations. The crews and maintainers often see three or four commanders change out before they have the opportunity to PCS. Before I moved over to the mission support group side, I thought that the Offutt gravitational pull only affected direct RC-135 operations, but I was wrong. The support officers do swap very regularly at the three year point, but the airman and NCOs can often make a career out of guarding our flight line or keeping our military personnel records straight.

The 55th Wing Association has always leaned heavily on our flying heritage, but we need to find ways to branch out to other 55thers who find a home at Offutt and have just as much to be proud about. The challenge is how to get to a broader audience, and how to sell the benefits of our organization. BGen Bacon is a strong supporter (of the Association) and I'm sure that Col Roche (the incoming CC) will be equally strong.

If we can ask for time at wing commander's calls we can take advantage of the captive audience. I don't think tables in front of the BX work well because people feel like they are under attack and find ways to avoid the contact. Also, we have

many great diplomats in our ranks who would be great speakers at squadron commander calls.

With over 12% of the wing deployed at any time, we also need to find more ways to support our Airman before they go and as they come back. Many different organizations work through the Airman and Family Readiness Center to provide phone cards, oil changes and babysitting to deployed families, so we could target support to folks as return.

The Ops Group use to coordinate a mini reception for the families of the returnees so that they had something to eat and drink and a place for folks to get updates. The departures are usually very tightly run, but sometimes Airman are left for hours on end in limbo when airlift slips.

In both cases, the **Association** could sponsor water bottles and basic snacks at a **55th Wing Association** table and we could have **Association** members on hand to hand out the snacks and help with crowd control. This suggestion does sound like USO receptions that I have received at many different bases, but because of those receptions, I give to the USO every year. This effort may mean having a ready team available to at least set up the table and would mean getting water bottles produced with the **55th Wing Association** information on them. Not an easy task, but maybe what the active duty would appreciate from their heritage association.

For us to gain traction with the active duty crowd we need to be more vocal and more visible. Who wouldn't want to be part of a great bunch of folks with a common heritage and a big heart for all of our Airman.
