He currently is a contractor with Crew Training International here at Offutt, training RC-135 navigators for the **55**<sup>th</sup> **Wing**. Welcome aboard Bill.

**Membership:** It all comes around to that. As you can see from the numbers reported in this newsletter in both the reunion reports and the 2012 year-end figures reported, membership is a fast moving target. At the beginning of each year there is an effort to bring those whose dues have expired at year's end back into the **Association** before the dues expiration date 1 April (grace period ends).

An **Association** addressed envelope is included in this mailing of the newsletter to facilitate dues paying and membership address and contact data updates.

The magic member number at the end of calendar 2012 was 623, and 665 the prior end year. A net loss of 42 for the year does not seem bad. The **55th Wing Association's** 29th reunion was one more rousing success. Dubbed the *Rocky Mountain High*, held in the Crowne Plaza Hotel, in south Colorado Springs, CO, attendees were able to enjoy the reunion events and a plethora of tours to just a few of the many attractions the area has to offer. Small in numbers, the alumni were large in fun, camaraderie and in enjoying renewing long and enduring friendships. (An attendance list is posted in the back of this newsletter. Please note that those who were **not** there are now marked as 'absent' in the Great Record Book.)

Reunion chair **Sandy Feldkamp**, and her worthy assistant **Alan**, worked diligently to plan another in the continuing series of memorable conclaves. They made sure no detail was missed, nice extras were added, and they were omnipresent to assure it all ran like clockwork. Kudos all around to that dynamic duo.

Early revelers rolled in for registration on Wednesday, 5 September, and the Board of Directors had a productive meeting in

#### **THURSDAY**

Many more arrived the next day, and after a breakfast buffet for all hands, **Hank Dubuy** organized the golf outing and shepherded 20 hackers to the USAF Academy Eisenhower Course.

A special side event on the 6th was coordinated by Al Feldkamp and **Robb Hoover** for a trip to the USAF Academy for the purpose of L-

Squadron 11, which is aligned with the 55<sup>th</sup> Wing.

Pres Thomas, Class of 1968, Hoover, Moore, Dubuy and **Major Chris Shannon**, an active duty reserve navigator who instructs with the 338<sup>th</sup> Combat Crew Training Sqd at Offutt, were met by an escort of cadets, then treated to lunch among the 4000-strong cadet wing in Mitchell Hall (*named for Billy, not Larry*). Completed in 28 minutes, it was go-go chow and very little time for sparking chitchat. Quite an experience.

They then went to the cadet squadron day-room in Arnold Hall where Major Brandon Johnson, Commander of Cadet Sqd 11, introduced the quintet for what was a mini-Tales of the 55<sup>th</sup>, precisely timed at 50 minutes. Serving as audio-visual aids for a Cold War history 'class', Thomas gave a brief resume' of the Association; Hoover introduced Dubuy who related his story of the attack by North Koreans on a 55<sup>th</sup> RB-47 in 1965; and Major Shannon to tell of a more recent encounter where NKorean fighters intercepted and harassed an RC-135 in 2010. Moore was introduced, but did not speak (what?!). As previously noted, there was just 50 minutes of the cadets' time allotted. ('Nuff said.)

It was a unique, rare, and satisfying opportunity for the 55<sup>th</sup> Cold Warriors and the nearly 100 cadets to interact on a personal level.



A Thursday afternoon informal reception was held in the hotel patio garden. Welcoming our merry band was Colorado Springs City Council President Scott Hente. Scott is a 55<sup>th</sup> alum having served as a navigator in EC/RC-135s and E-4s in the 2ACCS, 38th, 343<sup>rd</sup>, and 1 ACCS during the late 1970s and early 1980s.

Two Academy falcon handlers brought in one of the mascots to the delight of those on hand (pun intended, cuz that is where the falcon roosted. It did not fly).

That evening's festivity was attending a dinner and a melodrama, "The Code of the West", at the rustic Iron Springs Chateau in eclectic Manitou Springs.

On the bus ride to the theater, Bob Reehorn gave a running commentary on the colorful history and attractions of the area. (One tidbit: there are no springs in Colorado Springs. Naming it so was a shrewd marketing ploy by William J. Palmer, the

founder and major developer of Colorado Springs, to attract and lure Easterners to his enterprise.)

The group had a rowdy time vocally participating in the 'mellerdrammer's' action. Then all hands bussed back to the hotel and repaired to the hospitality suite to round out the night.

#### FRIDAY'S DOINGS

After a breakfast buffet, groups loaded buses for the day's tours. A large bunch headed for the Academy with Al Feldkamp providing narrative on the way. Stops included the static B-52, scenic overlooks, the Academy Visitor's Center, and the Chapel. From the walls near the Chapel, the tour joined many other visitors to observe the entire Cadet Wing gather for the noon formation and parade to lunch. Quite an operation to see, and it couldn't help but make one proud of the type of personnel who are selected to attend this great institution, which is molding the future leaders of the Air Force and society in general.

From there the folks proceeded to the Falcon Club for lunch, where five cadets were introduced and then sat at various tables to join the 'seasoned' citizens.

Col Joe Sanders, the Director of the Character Academy and Leadership Development Center, gave an enthusiastic briefing on the goals of the institution and the cadet training.

Another group took a ride to Cripple Creek to partake in the casinos, shopping, and dining in the scenic town. Six were dropped off for an intimate and very interesting tour of the Mollie Kathleen Gold Mine.

A casual dinner at the hotel and more hospitality time wound up this day.

#### SATURDAY JAMMED

Another breakfast buffet began this fully-packed day. The membership meeting commenced and moved smartly. Detailed minutes of that meeting appear after this article.

Once again buses were loaded and one headed for Peterson AFB and Alan F. was again the bus narrator. There the group visited the National Museum of WWII Aviation. They then had lunch at The Club where the guest speaker was NORTHCOM's **Colonel Jeff (Buffalo) Herd**, a former 55<sup>th</sup> Ops Group Commander. One more tour stop was at the Peterson Air and Space Museum where Docent **Bruce Long** regaled the group with history of the vintage aircraft before they returned to the hotel.

# 55TH WING ASSOCIATION MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES 8 SEPTEMBER 2012

0815 - Meeting called to order by President Jim Thomas. Convened per notice given in May 2012 **Association** newsletter. Quorum present.

Minutes from previous membership meeting at the reunion in Allen, TX: Max Moore moved to dispense with the reading of the minutes (which were published in the post-Texas reunion newsletter of July 2011). Seconded by **Jim Arbuckle**. Motion passed.

The president mentioned that it was still possible to purchase bricks for the Cold War Memorial patio and those who were interested in doing so should see **Bill Ernst**.

Membership report was provided by Michael Cook for presentation by the President. He announced there were 603 dues paying members (a snap shot of an ever changing day-to-day number) of which 43 were active duty troops. This is a slight decrease as members whose dues expired at the end of 2011 have been slow to renew in spite of various forms of reminders. However, extraordinary efforts by Cook and Moore did manage to retrieve approximately 70% of the members whose dues expired in January 2012.

Thomas reiterated the dues timing process of all dues expiring at 31 December of the year through which a member is paid. But, that there is a grace period until 1 April of the ensuing year until a person is declared delinquent and removed the mailing list.

Treasury report from Cook presented by the President: the current balance is \$34,400. In short "we are holding our own" with regard to members renewing and new members signing up to remain 'solvent' and meet the **Association**'s projected annual budgets now and into the near-term years.



The president then opened the floor to Bill Ernst, the Board of Directors nomination chairman. Ernst announced the slate for the BoD as all the incumbents: Jim Thomas, current Ricky McMahon, Michael Cook, Kevin Todd, Sam Pizzo, Don Griffin, Max Moore, Robb Hoover, Bill Ernst, Errol Hoberman, Jim Malonev, Dennis Haun, Larry Utley, George Ross, Fox Censullo. Pete Glenboski, and Don Kelly. He also announced that the active duty representatives 55<sup>th</sup> the previously nominated by Commander and approved by the BoD, were LtCol Paul Rehome and TSgt Jennette Johnson, the latter being approved at the most recent Board meeting, 5 September. She replaced LtCol Mo Krishna who left for a school assignment on short notice in August.

Ernst opened the floor for further nominations. There being none, Moore moved to close the nominations. Motion seconded by several. Motion carried.

Ernst then said he would entertain a motion to elect the nominees by acclamation. **Bill Simon** so moved. Motion seconded by many and carried.

Pres Thomas retook the podium and opened a discussion on how the **Association** could improve the recruiting of new and 'younger' members. A few members offered suggestions and opinions, but it was generally agreed that recruiting is a memberwide responsibility. Additional efforts will be made, and possible actions taken, by the Board before the next reunion to target new members from a 'lost generation' of **55**<sup>th</sup> veterans.

The next subject opened was for the 30th reunion in the spring of 2014. Thomas announced that BoD member Don Kelly had volunteered to chair a reunion in Omaha/Offutt area the exact date TBD. Discussion ensued on pros and cons, logistics, costs, attractions in the area, etc. But it was generally agreed that the main purpose for holding a reunion at Omaha/Offutt periodically, was to reconnect the membership with the active duty 55<sup>th</sup> Wing, and vice versa, for the reciprocal exposure.

Thomas asked if there were any other volunteers to host a reunion at any other sites. There were none.

Ernst moved to hold the next reunion at Omaha/Offutt in 2014 in conjunction with the Birthday Ball week (*late March, early April*), **if feasible**. Motion seconded and carried.

It was noted that the past three reunions attendance was at about 150-160 per, which is below the previous average of 210. A short discussion ensued as to what may be the reasons such as locale, costs, health issues, advertising, et al; but of course, there was no definitive answer.



**Elvio Palmeri**, the appointed enlisted member liaison, addressed the need to attract more former and current enlisted people into the **Association** membership.

President Thomas gave his overall report on **Association** activities during the past year to include the several interactions with the **55th Wing**. He emphasized that the current **55<sup>th</sup> Wing** commander, Colonel John Rauch, had multiple past tours in the Wing and was knowledgeable about and supportive of the **Association**.

Thomas detailed how the Wing Hall of Fame and the **Association**'s Award for Excellence, Heritage Week, and the Birthday Ball are examples of how the **Association** continues to contribute to

the Wing. Ernst elaborated that the **Association** administers the Hall selection process, which ensures appropriate inductees are honored. Moore also commented on how the Award for Excellence is accepted as a prestigious recognition for the active duty personnel who receive it.

It was announced that the re-elected Board of Directors would meet immediately after this meeting in order to elect officers.

There being no further business, the President adjourned the meeting at 0903.

#### MEMBERSHIP REPORT

As of 31 December 2012, there were 623 members in good standing, a decrease from 665 on that date in 2011.

But, as a matter of continuing **good faith** by the **Association**, the May 2012 issue of *Videmus Omnia* was mailed to those delinquent members in order to inform all hands about the upcoming reunion.

At the end of **2012**, 170 members' dues expired and we eagerly await their renewal.

**BATEMAN, William R.**, 76, 7 October 2012, Papillion, NE; wife, **Marilyn**. Bill was one of the original In-flight Maintenance Technicians (IMT) in the RC-135 program in the **55**<sup>th</sup> **Strategic Reconnaissance Wing** at Offutt AFB, NE, in the mid-1960s. He retired as a ChiefMSgt, and later worked a number of years for the Omaha Public Power District.

**BENZIGER, Alfred S.** (Jack), 82, 25 July 2012, Georgetown, ME; wife, **Thelma**. Jack was a long time RB-47 navigator in the 343<sup>rd</sup> at Forbes AFB, KS, in the 1960s. While on a jamming mission in Vietnam he was shot down, survived and was rescued. Last AF assignment was at Hanscom AFB, MA, from which he retired in 1978.

**BLANK, Joan E.**, 78, 25 August 2012, Seattle, WA; wife of **Ed** (of Gig Harbor) for 57 years, who was a staff officer at RAF Upper Heyford and then RAF Mildenhall, UK, 1975-78.

**BRAMMER, Paul L.** (**Bob**), 83, 27 December 2012, Atwater, CA; wife of 59 years, **Darlene**. Bob enlisted in the Air Force early in 1949 and became a gunner. He served in the **55**<sup>th</sup> in RB-50s at Ramey AFB, PR, in the early 1950s. He later went to OTS, became a KC-135 pilot, flew RB-66s in Vietnam, and retired as a colonel in 1976.

CAREY, John J., 74, 16 August 2012, Rochester, MN, formerly of Cook, NE; wife of 51 years, **Barbara**. John had a long history with the 55<sup>th</sup> as an RB-47 EWO at Forbes in the 1960s, then in the RC-135s at Offutt AFB, NE. He also commanded at various times in the 1970s AMS, FMS and OMS maintenance squadrons at Offutt. He retired to his farm 1986.

**CHISHOLM, John**, 64, 10 June 2012, Omaha, NE; wife, **Amy**. During his four years in the Air Force, he was an RC navigator in the 343<sup>rd</sup> at Offutt in the early 1970s. John then became a successful restaurateur in Omaha owning several franchises.

CLARY, James, C., 82, 7 December 2012, Omaha, NE; wife, Ardith. First recon assignment for Jim was an RC-135 pilot at Eielson AFB, AK. With the 55<sup>th</sup> SRW at Offutt, he commanded the 343<sup>rd</sup> SRS, then had a tour as commander at Shemya AFB, AK, and returned to the Wing as Deputy Commander for Ops, all in the mid-to late 1970s. His last position in the AF was as Director of Personnel Management at SAC HQ.

**CONKLIN, William G., II**, 64, Angleton, TX, 9 July 2012; wife **Eva**. Bill, a Pennsylvania native, served at Offutt as an RC-135 EWO in the 343<sup>rd</sup> SRS from 1979-84. He retired in 1987.

**CROWSON**, **Leona F.**, 88, 18 April 2012, Aurora, CO; wife of **Earl** a long-time RB-47 EWO in the **55**<sup>th</sup> **SRW** during the 1950s and 1960s at Forbes AFB, KS.

**DARBY, Larry**, 82, 11 December 2012, Las Vegas, NV. A long time member of the **55**<sup>th</sup> as an RB nav at Forbes in the 1960s, who later moved with the Wing to Offutt and crewed in RC-135s.

**DAVIS, Bennie L.**, 84, 24 September 2012, Georgetown, TX. General Davis was a US Military Academy graduate in 1950. A bomber pilot, he served as Commander-in-Chief, Strategic Air Command at Offutt from August 1981 until his retirement in August 1985.

**GMITTER, Robert J.**, 77, 29 August 2012, Canton, GA; wife, **Vera**. Bob was an RB-47 pilot in the 338<sup>th</sup> and 343<sup>rd</sup> at Forbes 1955-1967. He also served at Offutt and Eielson before retiring in 1970. He then earned a degree in accounting, and later was employed as a state auditor in Texas and Arkansas.

HOOVER, Robb L., 77, 29 October 2012, Bellevue, NE; wife of 50 years, Shirley. An absolute 55<sup>th</sup> stalwart for decades. Robb was an RB-47 EWO in the 343<sup>rd</sup> at Forbes in the mid-1960s, and RC-135s at Yokota AB, Japan, and Kadena AB, Okinawa, in the original cast of the 82nd SRS. He also had tours at RAF Mildenhall, UK, and at SAC HQ Intel and with the Joint Strategic Target Planning Staff. (See article to follow.)

**HOWE, Arlen M.**, 83, 9 September 2012, Papillion, NE; wife of 57 years, **Mary**. Affectionately known as "Ziggy", Arlen began his career as a navigator in RB-50s at Briggs AFB, TX, then had a long tenure with the **55**<sup>th</sup> at Forbes and

Offutt during the 1960s and '70s, plus a tour with the 82<sup>nd</sup> SRS at Kadena. After retiring from the AF in 1979, he had a successful career as a real estate agent.

Their daughter, **Melinda Kelly** (wife of **Association** BoD member Don), is currently secretary to the 55<sup>th</sup> **Wing** commander.

**KIEFER, Richard (Dick) J.**, 79, 26 August 2012, Tucson, AZ; wife of 57 years, **Carrie Lou**. A pilot in RB-47s in the **55**<sup>th</sup> at Forbes in the late 1950s, Dick was in the first cadre of RC-135D crews in the 6<sup>th</sup> SW at Eielson AFB, AK, in 1962. He was the base commander at Davis-Monthan, AZ, in 1974. Dick later commanded the 301<sup>st</sup> AREFW at Rickenbacker AFB, IN, then the 416th Bomb Wing at Griffiss AFB, NY, before retiring in 1980.

**LOPEZ, Juan**, 77, 30 August 2012, San Antonio, TX; wife, **Elaine**. Juan came to the **55**<sup>th</sup> at Offutt in the original roster of EWOs in the RC-135, circa 1967. He later served on the wing staff in INE, then in HQSAC Plans, and as commander of the USAF Security Service Wing at Misawa AB, Japan.

**MEDEARIS, Wayne**, 82, 3 November 2011, Hixson, TN; wife of 57 years, **Dolores**. An aircraft maintainer in the **55**<sup>th</sup> at Forbes, he also served in Korea and Vietnam, retiring as a Master Sergeant.

O'NEAL, Ray C. (Jumbo), 86, 4 September 2012, Joshua, TX; wife of 60 years, Marian. A WWII vet in the Army Air Corps, after a post-war break in service, Jumbo became a pilot in the Air Force and flew combat in Korea. He served with the 55<sup>th</sup> at Offutt in the late 1960s. Ray was commander at Shemya AB, and later of the 82nd SRS at Kadena. He retired in 1974 as commander of the SAC wing at McConnell AFB, KS.

**Robb Hoover** was an exceptional human being who left a remarkable legacy to the 55<sup>th</sup> Wing

**Association** and the *Fighting' Fifty-Fifth*. His contributions to both organizations are indelible and enduring.

Born in Logansport, IN, he grew up in Green Bay, WI, as a life-long Packer fan. He enlisted in the US Army at an early age and hitch-hiked cross-country many times when one did not have to fear running into an ax wielding cannibal.

He decided the military was where he wanted to remain and applied for the AF Aviation Cadet Program. Eventually graduating from Electronic Warfare Training at Keesler AFB, MS, his first assignment was in the **55**<sup>th</sup> **SRW** at Forbes AFB, KS, as an RB-47 raven in 1963. He later moved into the RC-135 at Yokota AB, Japan, and at Kadena AB, Okinawa.

Having attended the University of Wisconsin, and Washburn in Topeka, from where he received his degree, he always referred to himself as 'a liberal arts crow'.

There are no 'wild and crazy' Robb stories. He did not do anything frivolous or stupid enough to have it come back and haunt him (unlike many others we all know). But, he did do interesting things. Example: while stationed on Okinawa, when most took their R&Rs to Bangkok, Hong Kong, Taiwan, et al, Robb decided to go to Katmandu, in the kingdom of Nepal, in the Himalayas. Initially informed 'you can't get there from here', he



persevered through diplomatic bureaucracy, got the required visas, and found creative ways to travel the less than direct route to the exotic city.

Robb thought on a higher intellectual plane than most people, but he

was unassuming about his own thoughts and opinions as he constantly inquired and listened to others for their ideas and philosophies.

His fertile mind was full of innovative ideas. It was he who started the tradition of the *Tales of the*  $55^{th}$  event to precede the Birthday Ball.

He was the one who decided to procure the bell for the RAF Upper Heyford officer's club, and its eventual journey and evolution to become the 55<sup>th</sup> Wing Ceremonial Bell.

It was he who initiated the use of *Videmus Omnia*, the Wing motto, as a toast and closing to emails and correspondence.

He organized numerous seminars and symposiums on the history of SAC reconnaissance and 55<sup>th</sup> heritage. Flawless in his orchestrating and emceeing such events, his introductions were always informative and complementary to the speakers.

In addition to serving as the **Association**'s first vice president, and then historian for many years, he was the Program Chair for the Strategic Roost of the Association of Old Crows at Offutt for 20 years. He never failed to have a variety of interesting speakers and subjects. He was active in the Omaha World Affairs Council, the Offutt Book Club; and belonged to MOAA and AFA chapters, Rotary International, among other organizations.

After retiring from the Air Force in 1981, he worked for twenty years as a senior analyst for Science Applications International Corp, but never slowed in his other activities.

Robb had many accolades and honors bestowed upon him, but he was always humble and usually deflected the spotlight away to others. He never led his own parade.

Among those recognitions: Induction into the **55**<sup>th</sup> **Wing** Hall of Fame in 2011; having the Officer Training School auditorium at Maxwell AFB, AL, named Hoover Hall; the 343<sup>rd</sup> RS crew lounge has his name on it, as well as the squadron crews using "HOOVR" (as is, no typo) as their stateside call sign. In 2006 he was the Grand Marshall of the official Nebraska Veterans Day parade in Bellevue.

Robb was one of a kind, a truly unique personality. We will not see the likes of him again. An irreplaceable 55<sup>th</sup> icon, he will be forever missed and has left a colossal void.

# THE RUSSIANS ARE COMING! THE RUSSIANS ARE COMING! OOPS, THEY ARE HERE!

One day in early August of this year (2012), I received an e-mail from a gent whom I had never met nor had any conversation or e-mail contact. He stated he was a professor at a New England university who was coordinating a trip by Russian TV producers, and was calling on behalf of some

Russians who would be visiting the States intent on writing an article regarding Soviet **Premier Nikita Khrushchev's** visit to **President Dwight Eisenhower** back in 1959.

How he knew of my involvement as a navigator on those way-back Russian flights I do not know. But that he did, and he wanted my okay in order to advise them that they could get in touch with me as to the role I played back then. Those flights included nine TU-104 flights between Iceland, England and Washington. The final flight was into Moscow on a TU-114 returning the Premier back home.

I stated my consent, sent him a copy of my book, *As Good As It Gets*. He in turn forwarded a book he had written regarding Russian fighter aircraft of WWII.

A short time later he advised me of the intended date of their visit with me. They showed precisely at the scheduled time of day, but, two days **earlier** than expected.

There were four of them, and just one spoke English. Mary and I were eating dinner, so to say we were a bit surprised is a big understatement.

However, they set up a camera, lights, etc, and the interview began. They had a copy of my book with them, so it is my opinion the interview went rather quickly as they already had most of the data they might need for their production of a DVD covering that visit by Khrushchev.

We spoke for about 20 minutes or so, and it went rather well I thought, until the gent in charge got a real serious look on his face and posed this question to me: "Who do you think started the Cold War?" I replied that I thought both sides were

responsible for that action. However, that evidently was not what he wished to hear as the interview ended rather abruptly.

I offered them some coffee, we chatted a bit, and they showed me a photo of two Russian pilots sitting in a cockpit and asked if I remembered them, to which I said that I did not. He seemed surprised and said they were the pilots on the aircraft that flew us from Washington to Moscow.

That was **only** about 60 years ago, and I'm right at 90 years young, and I should remember **that one day?!** Add to that, my back was to the pilots during the entire flight to Moscow, and I was escorted out of the cockpit once we hit Soviet air space.

If I remember correctly, navs didn't make a big deal out of remembering pilots too often back in those days!

I was informed that a DVD would be forthcoming sometime after the end of the year and I was promised a copy. When I asked if it would be in English, I received no reply. I can hardly wait to store that away.

I have often thought that even though I did not have a clue as to why I was selected to go along with **Augustine Puckrik** (a RB 47 Aircraft Commander), who spoke fluent Russian in addition to six other languages, that this trip was very instrumental to whatever successes I may have later enjoyed during my Air Force career.

Some guys just luck out now and then, and I was one of them.


