This could be HUGE and comparable to the reunion in 2006, as it will be held at the same time as the 55th Wing's Heritage Week special events at Offutt AFB. This will be a rare opportunity for many of our members to participate in those events.

The headquarters for the festivities will be the Embassy Suites in LaVista, NE. You can begin your planning by calling the hotel to make reservations at (402) 331-7400. Please use the group name "2014 55th Wing Association", or group code "FF1", to get the special reunion rate of \$102 per night (plus taxes and fees, of course). The rate includes breakfast buffet each morning and cocktail receptions in the evenings.

For computer savvy folks, you can log onto our reunion's personalized group web page, which will automatically load the hotel and group information. 

For example, Friday the 11^{th} may include static displays, various base tours, including the simulator and squadron roll calls, as well as the Hall of Fame induction ceremony and the *Tales of the* 55th.

There will be the usual membership meeting on Saturday morning at the hotel, and the reunion will culminate that evening by joining members of Team Offutt of all ranks, local dignitaries, and retirees at the gala 36th annual **55th Wing** Birthday Ball in the LaVista Embassy Convention Center Ballroom (Attached to the hotel.)

This event is the Wing's largest formal social event of the year. First held in January 1979, it was founded by then-Colonel **Regis F.A. Urschler**, the 55th SRW commander, with the aim of connecting the active duty members to the heritage and storied history of the *Fightin' Fifty-Fifth*. Attendance is usually between 800-900, about 10% of whom are Association members and guests (*local and out of town. See related article following in this issue*).

Reunion attendees will have our own section of tables with sign up/assigned seating, as we usually do for our banquet. Recommended attire for gentlemen on this occasion will be the Association tie with dark business suit or jacket. Mess dress for active duty. This will be a singular opportunity for those of you who have never attended this outstanding event to experience a truly grand evening of traditions, dining and dancing.

You now have just enough info to whet the appetite for the next BIG ONE. Plenty of time to make plans, buy a new **Association** polo shirt and get a 'regimental' tie. Be here before you know it.

ASSOCIATION MEMBERSHIP DIRECTORY EDITOR'S COMMENTS

As an FYI, the newsletter is **usually** mailed via USPS third-class, bulk mail postage, being the economical choice. Thus, it is **not** forwarded to members who relocate, **nor returned** to the **Association** if not deliverable for whatever reason (misaddressed, person moved or is deceased, etc.)

The dual mailing of the January issue of the *Videmus Omnia* and the directory was sent firstclass, the first time since December of 2010. So, depending on when a member or widow last changed addresses, one may have missed the following newsletters: February and July 2011, February and May 2012. Those are available on the **Association** web site in the newsletter archives and can be accessed, read and/or printed from there as one desires.

As a result of the first-class mail, over 40 packages were returned for various reasons (about 5%). Some members had moved and new addresses were provided by the USPS even though the time limit for forwarding had passed. Others had to be researched. 55TH CREWS AND AIRCRAFT MARK 10,000TH SORTIE IN SW ASIA

The 763rd Expeditionary Reconnaissance Sqd (ERS) completed its 10,000th sortie in Southwest Asia since it began flying in the region 23 years ago, unit officials announced. The squadron hit the milestone sortie on 10 April 2013

The squadron, which operates electronic reconnaissance RC-135 from a forward area base, has been a continuing presence in Southwest Asia dating from the first Gulf War, supporting coalition troops in Afghanistan and Iraq.





On Final Approach

"The job we do helps get people home safely," said LtCol **Brian Lebeck**, 763rd ERS director of operations. "If we can do that for even one or two soldiers on the ground, that makes it worth the effort," he added.

The squadron's RC-135 flights average about 10 hours in duration, according to the release.

The aircraft and crews are on detached duty from the **55th Wing** at Offutt AFB, NE.

TALES OF THE 55TH

The fourteenth edition was held on Friday, 3 May 2013, in the CMSAF James M. McCoy Airmen Leadership School with Association President Thomas as honcho and emcee.

This year, Thomas opened with recognition of the late **Robb Hoover**, founder of the **Tales** in January 2000. Thomas stated that Robb is still a sponsor of the event via memorials donated to the **Association** in his name. Thomas also made a moving tribute to Robb and his contributions to the Wing, the **Association** and his community.

As is now an established tradition, the program began with the ringing of the 55th Ceremonial Bell by the current 55th Wing Commander, Col John Rauch, and three past wing kings: L to R: Steve Stevens, Larry Mitchell, and Reg Urschler.



A short history of the bell was noted by Thomas, who then read a letter from **Chuck Meyer** of Stanton, NE, 'the last man standing' from the six RB-47 crewmembers whose names are engraved on the bell. Chuck expressed his regrets due to health issues, but elaborated on the bell's history, yet another Robb Hoover initiative.

Col Rauch gave a few opening remarks welcoming the attendees, and about the Wing's impressive record the past several months.

Thomas also touched on the significance of the **55th Wing** Hall of Fame and introduced those members in attendance. In addition to the three former wing CCs mentioned above, **Hank Dubuy**, **Bill Ernst, Joe Siniscalchi, Mike Cook**, and **James R. Taylor** were recognized.

Thomas gave a vignette about a WWII 55th Fighter Group unique and first of its kind mission, when P-38s were used as bombers on an airfield in

France. The ranks of the Greatest Generation are thinning, plus age and health factors prevent many from traveling to attend this event in recent years.

Bill Sargent, who is the **Association**'s historian, presented his tale of Cobra Ball deployment operations when he was an RC navigator in the 24th RS and 45th RS at Shemya AFB, AK, and out of Diego Garcia in the Indian Ocean.

He was followed by **LtCol Richard Messina**, who related his experience as detachment commander of an operating location in Curacao, Dutch Antilles, just north of the coast of Venezuela. The RC-135 missions in June-September 2012 were for counter narcotics support to the Columbian military, and had a significant impact.

The event closed with Col Rauch joining the speakers to toast all the wings troops who are deployed around the globe; befitting the slogan that *"The sun never sets on the Fightin' Fifty-Fifth."*

Attendance grows every year as most of the Wing's senior staff, and an eclectic group of active duty troops, retirees, families, and assorted visitors in town for the Birthday Ball, fill the venue. It is a must-see event for out-of-towners, and is a mini-reunion of sorts.

Heritage displays from various wing units, food, beverages and 'redistribution of property' were all part of the festivities.

Co-sponsoring the Tales with the **Association** are local chapters of the Order of Daedalians and Association of Old Crows. Thomas also recognized the many individuals and units of Team Offutt who help set up the logistics and layout of the Tales to make it a successful event.

The Ball celebrated the 72th anniversary of the unit from its roots in the activation of the **55th** Pursuit Group at Hamilton Field, CA, in January 1941, during World War II.

ARMSTRONG, Eve, 86, 22 November 2011, Sequim, WA; widow of **Don**, an RC pilot who served many years during the early 1960s at Eielson AFB, AK, who passed in 2001. Eve was born in the UK, and at 17 served in the British Army Auxiliary during WWII. Immigrating to the US in 1945, where she had her own careers in entertainment and with Sears.

BAUGH, David S., 80, 10 April 2013, Dallas, TX; wife, **Joy**. An RB-47 pilot in the **55th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing (SRW)** at Forbes AFB, KS, in the early to mid-1960s, Dave moved to B-52s and survived a crash. He also served in Vietnam, and after retirement, became a civilian flight instructor.

BRITTON, Mary, 89, 21 April 2011, Green Valley, AZ; widow of **Ray**, passed in 1999. Ray was a long time **55th SRW** RB-47 pilot at Forbes circa 1950s-1960s.

BUGLEWICZ, Frances J. (Fritz), Jr., 79, 1 April 2013, Papillion, NE; wife, **Candy**. A Sout'Omaha native, Fritz was a tanker navigator at Lincoln AFB, NE; then was in the 34th ARS, the 2ACCS, and Command Support Airlift (CSA) in the **55th** at Offutt AFB, NE, from the late 1960s through 1985. That stretch was interrupted with a Vietnam tour where he flew 67 combat missions in EC-130s.

FRENCH, Donald W., 81, 29 September 2011, Georgetown, TX. Retired electrical engineer. May have been an RB-50 EWO in the 1950s. *Only info known*.

KEATON, James H., 61, 15 March 2013, Tomball, TX. An USAF Academy graduate, class of 1974, Jim served 20 years in the Air Force. He flew with the 38thRS at Offutt from late 1988 and early 1990s in Operations Desert Shield/Storm.

KENNEDY, EDWARD C., 76, 23 February 2013, Kerrville, TX; wife of over 54 years, **Jane**. Ed came to the **55th SRW** out of EW school and flew in the RB-47 until the early 1960s. He went into B-58s and then had a tour in Vietnam in F-105 Wild Weasels. He retired in 1978.

LENZ, **Howard T.**, 78, 21 October 2011, Rapid City, SD. An RB-47 navigator at Forbes AFB, KS, in the early 1960s, Howie was in the first cadre of RC-135 crews at Offutt circa 1966. He later served in the Plans directorate, then transferred to Ellsworth AFB, SD, and retired in 1978.

MCKECHNIE, Mary, 82, 11 November 2010, Alexandria, VA; widow of **John**, passed 2008. In the early to mid-1950s, John was an RB-50 crewman at Ramey AFB, PR, and later flew RB-47s at Forbes. After that he became a missileer.

METCALF, Edna, 80+, 5 November 2010, Plain Dealing, LA; widow of **Cony**, passed in 2004. Cony was a **55th SRW** pioneer, an engineer on RB-29s in the early 1950s. He left the Air Force and served with Trans World Airlines for 32 years.

NICHOLL, Robert (Bob) A., 86, 8 June 2013, Henderson, NV; wife of 62 years, **Virginia (Ginni)**. Enlisting in the US Army Air Corps in 1944 he served as an airborne radio operator in Africa and the Pacific. Bob later was commissioned and became a pilot. An RC pilot with the **55th** at Offutt in the mid-1960s, he later was the commander of the 82nd SRS at Kadena AB, Okinawa, in 1969. He had a follow-on tour in Vietnam and then was the wing commander at Grissom AFB, IN.

PARKER, Frances H., 87, 30 January 2013, Gainesville, FL; wife of **Edward**. She worked at the Reitz Union Hotel on the U of Florida campus for many years, also in real estate, and as a Mary Kay sales representative a number of years.

PARKER, Edward H., 91, 15 February 2013, Gainesville, FL. Ed was a Korean War vet and an early recon pioneer as a navigator in RB-50s with the 55th at Ramey and Barksdale AFB, LA. He survived an RB-50 crash at Offutt on 26 February 1952. He later was an EWO in RB-47s at Forbes from 1955-1965.

PIZZO, Mary L., 87, 9 January, 2013, Mandeville, LA; wife of **Sam** for 68 years. Mary was the consummate Air Force wife, devoted spouse and mother. Sam, a WWII veteran, was an RB nav at Forbes in the late 1950s and early 1960s. He was the first elected president of the **Association** and still serves on the Board of Directors.

POKORNY, Walter T., 78, 28 February 2013, Bellevue, NE; wife **Ruth**. A navigator in EC/RC-135s at Offutt in the 1970s, Walt later served in the 2ACCS battle staff. **SANDELL, Norman R.**, 81, 25 April 2012, Tucson, AZ; wife of 60 years, **Bonnie**. Norm was a Cold War and Vietnam veteran who served as a KC-97 pilot in the **55th** Air Refueling Sqd (ARS) at Forbes, 1958-1962.

WEST, JOYCE A., 76, 1 July 2012, Beaver Creek, OH; widow of **Charles**, who passed in January 2003. He was a KC-97 navigator with the 55th ARS at Forbes in the early 1960s.

WILSON, Edward (Ned), 79, 1 January 2013, Boyd, TX; wife of 31 years, Mary (also a retired Air Force officer). A Kansas native, Ned was an RB nav at Forbes from 1955. He moved to Offutt with the 55th in 1966 as an RC-135 nav, then went into Plans and later served for six years as the executive officer to five wing commanders. His last assignment was in tanker ops at Kadena AB, Okinawa, where he retired in 1983 to be an AF spouse.

Hello Max,

I have really enjoyed reading the *Videmus Omnia* newsletters and getting caught up.

I noticed in the (*January*) newsletter your story, "Third Generation 55^{th} "er Assigned to the Wing" had a challenge attached to it. It was whether anyone else could claim three generations assigned to the 55^{th} .

I think the Zyndas (my father, myself and oldest son) can claim to be a part of this unique group. All three of us have the same name, were at one time or another assigned to the 55^{th} , but were not all pilots.

My father, **Edmund Paul Zynda** (Warrant Officer, Retired), joined the Army Air Corps as a flight officer, then later became a flight engineer when the Air Force was stood up. He served during WWII, Korean War and Vietnam. He was at one time stationed at Forbes Field, KS, (*in RB-50s*) but I do not know the exact dates. When he retired in 1966 he had over 12,000 flying hours. Unfortunately, Agent Orange got the best of him and he is buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

I was stationed at Offutt AFB a few times - first in the 6949th Electronic Security Sqd as an Airborne Maintenance Technician (1981-1985) and then later as a navigator on the RC135 variants in the 38^{th} SRS (1987-1990) and $24^{th}/45^{th}$ RS (1990-1992). I was also in the **55**th Ops Support Sqd as the Chief, Wing Navigation, and later as the Chief, Wing Aircrew Life Support. I ended up flying with the 1ACCS aboard the E4-B before retiring in 2000.

Pricing: 3 x 5 - \$24 Nylon, \$34 Cotton; 5 x 8 - \$42 Nylon, \$59 Cotton (plus \$6 shipping and 5% Virginia sales tax). Nylon is recommended if the flag will be flown outside. You may also choose a **specific significant date** on which you would like the flag flown over the Memorial.

LAW UPDATES VETERANS SALUTING FLAG AND ANTHEM Reminder Reprint

WASHINGTON (AFRNS) October 31, 2008 --Veterans and active-duty military not in uniform can render the military-style hand salute during the playing of the national anthem, thanks to changes in federal law that took effect this month.

"The military salute is a unique gesture of respect that marks those who have served in our nation's armed forces," said **Dr. James B. Peake**, Secretary of Veterans Affairs. "This provision allows the application of that honor in all events involving our nation's flag."

The new provision improves upon a little known change in federal law (*in 2007*) that authorized veterans to render the military-style hand salute during the raising, lowering or passing of the flag, but it did not address salutes during the national anthem. Last year's provision also applied to service members while not in uniform.

Traditionally, members of the nation's veterans service organizations have rendered the hand-salute during the national anthem and at events involving the national flag while wearing their organization's official headgear.

The most recent change, **authorizing hand**salutes during the national anthem by veterans and out-of-uniform military personnel, was sponsored by Senator Jim Inhofe of Oklahoma, an Army veteran. It was included in the Defense Authorization Act of 2009, which President George W. Bush signed October 14, 2008.

The **previous provision** authorizing handsalutes for veterans and out-of-uniform service members during the raising, **lowering or passing of the flag**, was contained in the National Defense Authorization Act of 2008, which took effect Jan. 28, 2008. (*Courtesy of VA News*)
