There were 493 members in good standing as of 15 June 2016, compared with 542 on 31 December 2015. Unfortunately, dues and members do expire. (See TAPS.)

An added link is in the Members Only page, where any member can check on his/her DUES EXPIRATION DATE. This area is updated periodically and may not reflect recent renewals.

Also on the front page is an area for members to enter their email address, and then they will be notified when there's been a change or update to the web site.

Any member who wishes to read and/or download **Association** newsletters from the web site can do so. That allows members to read the latest issue as soon as it is published, as well as read it wherever in the world one might be at anytime.

55th WING OLMSTEAD-MCKONE TROPHY

The 55th Wing established a 'squadron of the year' award in 2011. It was named the **Olmstead**-

McKone Trophy after two historic figures from the 55th Strategic

Reconnaissance

Wing Cold War days.

Copilot Bruce
Olmstead and
Navigator John
McKone were



survivors of an RB-47H shoot down by a Soviet MiG on 1 July 1960 in an unprovoked attack over international waters of the Barents Sea.

(Four other members of that crew perished: Aircraft Commander Willard Palm and the raven team of Oscar Goforth, Dean Phillips and Eugene

Posa. All six are members of the Wing's Hall of Fame.)

Olmstead and McKone were subsequently picked up at sea and spent the next seven months in the notorious Lubyanka prison in Moscow. They were released in January 1961 as a gesture to new **President John F. Kennedy**. They were also featured on the cover of TIME magazine.



The presentation is made at the **Wing's** annual awards banquet in February.

WING'S HERITAGE TAKES CENTER STAGE

In an effort to educate current **55th Wing** members about the Wing's illustrious history, the first in a series of heritage events took place at the 97th Intelligence Squadron on 5 February.

More than 50 active duty Airmen joined four members of the **55th Wing Association**, the Wing's 'alumni group', to share a few stories from their time with the *Fightin' Fifty-Fifth*.

"We have such a tremendous history and I don't know if any other wing in the Air Force that celebrates theirs as much as we do," said **Colonel Marty Reynolds**, **55th Wing** Commander, who attended

This year is special for the **55th**, as the **Wing** marks 25 years deployed, 50 years at Offutt and 75 years as a wing.

"It is unique to hit these milestones at the same time, so we think it's a great opportunity to take time to reflect on some of our **Wing's** accomplishments throughout history through these heritage events," Reynolds said.

Retired colonels **Jim Thomas** and **Bill Ernst**, retired lieutenant colonel **Max Moore**, and retired major **Bill Sargent**, who have more than 70 years combined experience with the **Wing**, all shared stories from their careers.

"Seeing those younger professionals renews my faith that the Air Force is in good hands and minds," Moore said. "Their respect and rapt attention was gratifying to us senior veterans. I really enjoyed the experience and it exceeded my pre-notion of what it would be."

Hearing the **55th Wing** veterans' stories was also a welcome experience for the active duty members.

"Understanding how it all started and where we come from provides a sense of identity and community," said **SMSgt Vanessa Johnston** (who organized the event), of the 97th IS's mission management flight. "I hope that by exposing airmen to stories from our past, they become inspired and can see that we would not be where we are today without the people who came before us."

Besides sharing stories from their time with the **Wing**, the **Association** wanted to let the active duty members know they are firmly behind them as they support multiple missions around the world.

"This was a great opportunity for us to come back and let the younger troops know we know what they're going through," Thomas said. "There are a lot of us veteran *Fifty-Fifth'ers* who pay attention to what they're doing, and we want them to know that we care about them, and are thankful for the support they are providing our country."

TALES OF THE 55TH

On Friday, 20 May 2016, in Dock 1, of the **55**th maintenance facility, a large audience of active duty personnel, veteran **55**th'ers, and guests, witnessed another program to include three Tale talkers.

Hank Dubuy recounted his experience as copilot on Hobart Mattison's crew in April 1965. Their RB-47 aircraft was on a routine reconnaissance mission out of Yokota AB, Japan, when North Korean fighters made an unprovoked attack on the aircraft in international airspace over the Sea of Japan, east of the Korean peninsula.

Dubuy reported returning fire from the RB's tail guns and the probable hit on one bogey.

Although severely damaged from the MiG cannon fire, the RB-47 was safely recovered to Yokota due to the skill of LtCol Mattison, and superior professional crew coordination.

A terrorist incident in Athens, Greece, in August 1987 was the premise of **Jeff Needham's** tale. As an RC-135 crew was enroute to their hotel quarters after completing an operational mission, their unmarked bus was targeted by a terrorist motorcyclist's bomb.

The detonation injured 10 people on the bus, including the Greek driver, and some bystanders. The bus was badly damaged, so once the crew gathered themselves, they made the rest of the trip to the hotel on foot. Those airmen who were injured each were awarded a Purple Heart Medal.

The third speaker was **MSgt Michael Johnson**, **55**th Ops Group, Weapons and Tactics, who was the Airborne Mission Supervisor (AMS) on an RC-mission flown on 12 November 2015 to provide intelligence support to US and coalition forces involved in Operation INHERENT RESOLVE, combat operations against ISIS forces in Iraq. MSgt Johnson was the key position coordinating all the mission efforts.

The crew of the PYTHON 71, was comprised of crewmembers from five tactical squadrons and the

55th Ops Group, and three from the Royal Air Forces 51 Squadron.

As AMS on the mission, MSgt Johnson held the audience's rapt attention explaining how the crew of PYTHON 71 ensured dedicated intelligence support to three distinct ground force operations: totaling over 7,500 troops, seven manned aircraft, and multiple remote piloted aircraft.

He related how the crew's accomplishments that date were awarded the Air Force Association's **General Jerome F. O'Malley Award**, "Best Reconnaissance Crew in the Air Force".

In another heritage occasion, the crew of PYTHON 71 was also recognized by the 55th Ops Group as the "Best Reconnaissance Crew of the Wing" with presentation of the Palm Memorial Trophy in a ceremony led by Ops Group commander, Colonel Mo Krishna, on 20 May 2016 in the 38th Recon Squadron's jam packed Raiders Lounge including several Association members.

(This was the initial award of the replicated trophy since it was **returned** to the **Wing** after herculean efforts of Jim Thomas and the **Association** at the Tales event in May 2015. Related articles were in the July 2015 and January 2016 issues of **Videmus Omnia**.)

2016 HALL OF FAME

The two inductees for 2016 are senior NCOs with superior careers who were, and continue to be, outstanding role models and mentors.

The following narratives merely scratch the surface of their numerous significant accomplishments.

* * * * *

ChiefMSgt Dennis Haun (USAF Retired) was assigned to the 55th in 1992 where he became the first Maintenance Superintendent of the then 24th RS.

He was tasked to establish Air Combat Command's (ACC) first-ever Quality Assurance (QA) program. Blending the former SAC QA into the new ACC QA was a major challenge due to the differing cultures.

This had to be accomplished at Offutt, and all forward groups and squadrons assigned to the **55th**. The Chief expertly employed and maintained the QA program's rigorous nature of the inspection system previously established by SAC. The Chief got it done in a well coordinated effort.

Along with the changeover of the 24th RS to the 45th RS, there was a mixing of diverse missions; including the movement of the CB-and TC-135 trainer/logistical support missions from Eielson AFB, AK, to Offutt, integrating the WC-135 operations, and WC-135 OPEN

SKIES missions from McClellan AFB, CA. The challenges were daunting.

Chief Haun made significant and lasting contributions during his tenure. His impact continued well beyond his days in the squadron as many of the men and women he mentored are senior leaders in the 55th Wing Maintenance Group today.

Since 2012, Chief Haun has maintained his support to the **Wing** as the **55**th Operations Group (OG) Facilities Manager. He provides real property management for Ops Group squadrons.

Among the activities he is involved in today are the plans for the next runway closure, and the eventual move of the Wing into Bldg 500.

The 45th designated its briefing room in Chief Haun's honor in 2006, an enduring legacy pre-validating his selection as a member of the **Wing's** Hall of Fame.

MSgt John H. "Bubba" Armintrout, (USAF Retired) tenure encompassed 15 years in units at Offutt, AFB, NE: 6949th Electronic Security Squadron, and the 97th Intelligence Squadron (IS), **55th** Wing, 1982-1990, 1996-2003.

Originally a Spanish linguist, "Bubba" attained legendary status in his career field. MSgt Armintrout spent over 2000 days deployed in support of US Central Command operations serving in war on terrorism in Iraq and Afghanistan.

In addition to his primary job as a linguist, MSgt Armintrout mastered all enlisted RC-135 operational positions to include Flight Chief, Operations Analysis, Mission Management, Stan/Eval and Operations Training.

He was one of the first Data Link Operators helping to define the procedures that brought the RC-135 into a new era of intelligence collection, to rapid dissemination of a useable product for warfighters, procedures that remain relevant today.

Additionally, he mastered the Airborne Mission Supervisor crew position on all collection variants of the RC-135.

"Bubba" made an impact in the motivating and training of generations of airman to getting the mission done. MSgt Amintrout's talents and desires were to get the troops fully trained and equipped for their mission roles.

He never stopped taking care of his personnel, and he was especially adept at instilling that ethic among the troops.

MSgt Amintrout's dedicated professionalism, versatility, and his devotion to duty and to his fellow service members earned MSgt Armintrout his place in the **55**th **Wing** Hall of Fame.

Other features included the announcement of the 2015 **55**th **Wing Association** Award for Excellence winner, the presentation of the Hall of Fame inductees, and dancing to the Heartland of America Band.

The 750 attendees included about 100 **Association** members and guests. Although there were a number of the usual suspects, not as many out of towners this year due to date conflicts.

Former wing commanders there were Regis Urschler, Larry Mitchell, Don Bacon, BGen John Rauch, and Steve Stevens.

The sixth ChiefMSgt of the Air Force (Ret) **James McCoy** attended, as well as former 55th **Wing** Command Chiefs **Michael Parente**, **Vicki Swingle** and **Rich Casey** attended.

The governor of Nebraska, **Pete Ricketts** and his wife attended for the third year in a row. He is the only **sitting** governor who has ever been to the Ball.

Among numerous other dignitaries were: Congressman **Jeff Fortenberry** (R-NE), Congressman **Brad Ashford** (D-NE), several state senators (*including 55th alum Bob Krist and his wife*, **Peg**) and Bellevue Mayor **Rita Sanders**.

The committee was headed by 1Lt Meagan Kusel and MSgt Timothy Coenen of the 55th Maintenance Squadron. Volunteer members of the committee come from several units in the Wing.

Max Moore represents the **Association** as an advisor to that committee.

SrAmn Buford previously was named Airman of the Month, Airman of the Quarter, and Senior Airman of the **55**th **Wing**, recognized for his consistently superior performance.

His expertise in managing stan/eval programs, evaluations, training, and crew publications, was outstanding. He flew 39 missions in EC-130 COMPASS CALL missions in which ISIS targets were destroyed, and enemy personnel were captured or killed as a result of those interdictions.




HISTORIC ANNIVERSARIES BOOKLET

He was the recipient of the Medal of Honor. I don't recall the citation but would assume it would be available "somewhere" on the internet.

(Ed. Note: Of course Herr General is correct. A condensed account of Lawley's courageous actions follows. He is honored with a brick in the Cold War Memorial patio at the center front of the monument. It is the only brick with gold lettering.)

Lawley joined the Army Air Forces from Birmingham, AL, in April 1942, and by 20 February 1944 was a 1Lt serving as a B-17 pilot in the 364th Bomb Sqd, 305th Bomb Group. On that

day, during a bombing mission over Nazicontrolled Europe, his B-17 came under attack by numerous enemy fighter aircraft.

Eight crewmen were wounded and the copilot killed. With his plane severely damaged and on fire, he ordered his crew to parachute to safety.

Finding two crewmen who were too badly injured to bail out, Lawley, despite his own serious wounds, decided to stay with the plane.

1Lt Lawley, painfully wounded about the face, forced the copilot's body off the controls, brought the plane out of a steep dive, flying with his left hand only. Blood covered the instruments and windshield and visibility was a challenge.

With a full bomb load the plane was difficult to maneuver and bombs could not be released because the racks were frozen. Although weakened from loss of blood and shock, Lawley was able to make a

successful crash landing in England.

Lawley recovered from his wounds and, on

August 8, 1944, was awarded the **Medal of Honor**.

He reached the rank of colonel before leaving the Air Force in 1972. He died 30 May 1999 at age 78 and is buried in Birmingham, AL.

Hi Max:

I have to give you a lot of credit for what you have been doing in publishing the newsletter all these years.

It's been a long time since I left Forbes, but I can still remember arriving there on the morning of 3 June 1954. (Wow, 62 years ago!) I was the first one of our group to arrive there.

After lunch I took a walk to look at the B-29's from the outside the fence, when all of the sudden, I heard someone calling my name. Needless to say, I was shocked as no one there could know me.

It was a friend of mine from back home. He was a mechanic on the B-29's and he told me that he was getting out of the Air Force as soon as the B-29's were gone.

So, I had to close down the Bomb/Nav shop in the UK, before returning home to Forbes. I didn't

know the **Wing** had moved to Offutt AFB. What a shock that was!

That was the second time that I was surprised to see all the bombers and tankers gone from Forbes. The first time was when I was in England and I was told to pack my bags and clear the base in one hour as I was flying home. I asked why, all they would say is, I would find out. That was October 1962 during the Cuban Missile Crisis.

Thirteen years after my first day at Forbes, on 15 June 1967, I was the last 55th'er to leave Forbes after arriving home from England.

Well, Max, now that you woke up a 'dead man', it's time for me to quit. LOL!

SAC HALL OF FAME FIRST CLASS INDUCTED

The gala function was held on Thursday 7 April 2016, at The **Strategic Air Command** and



Aerospace Museum in Ashland, NE. The event was held to raise money and awareness for its mission.

The theme was *Wings* of *Freedom* and included recognizing and honoring former Strategic Air

Command (SAC) heroes, and commemorating past contributors.

The cocktail reception began at 1730, with the sit-down dinner at 1800.

The SAC Hall of Fame inducted its first members at the event. They included: General Curtis LeMay, who led SAC for nearly 10 years, and established its headquarters at Offutt AFB, NE; General Thomas Power, who succeeded LeMay in 1957 and led the command for seven years; General Richard Ellis, who was the command's ninth leader from 1977-1981; General Bernard **Schriever**, widely regarded as the father of the Air Force's ballistic missile and military space programs; and retired CMSAF James McCoy, who at 85 is the only living member to be inducted. The Chief established the command's noncommissioned officer academy and its NCO leadership programs, and later served as SAC's senior enlisted adviser. McCoy was the sixth the Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force, 1979-1981. (Chief McCoy is a member of the 55th Wing Association)

Other posthumous inductees include **J. Robert Beyster**, who founded the Science Applications International Corp in 1969; and **Arthur C. Storz**, **Sr.**, who played a key role in promoting Offutt as the location for SAC headquarters.

"Funds raised from the gala will be used to support operations, preserve artifacts and exhibits of SAC history, and help the museum make needed improvements in its 18-year-old facility," said **Museum Director Michael McGinnis**.

Among the many dignitaries attending, President Jim Thomas showed the **Association** logo at the event.

MUSEUM NAME CHANGE AND DEDICATION

A press release dated **25 June 2015**, announced that the Strategic Air and Space Museum Board of Directors approved the Museum staff's recommendation to rename the museum the "Strategic Air Command and Aerospace Museum".

The change became official immediately, but the name dedication and unveiling of the logo occurred 21 May 2016. (See following article.)

(Also FYI: The original museum in 1959 was the Strategic Air Command Museum until 1966 (when it was at the north end of Offutt AFB), and again from 1991-2001. The name was the Strategic Aerospace Museum from 1966-1991.

The newer building near Ashland, NE, opened in 1998 as the **Strategic Air Command** Museum. The name was officially changed to Strategic Air and Space Museum in 2001. That was done without any public input from museum members, or SAC veterans, or the public, and without public advance notice.

Of course there was controversy and an unfavorable backlash at that time.

The ceremony at the Museum on Saturday, 21 May 2016, celebrated the name change and a rededication of its mission, and noted 70 years of Strategic Air Command history.

Over 200 SAC veterans and guests, including several **Association** members, attended and enjoyed a continental breakfast and social time before the formal program.

A ceremonial ribbon cutting led by Museum Director McGinnis and Chief McCoy included the featured guest speakers: MGen (Ret) Bill Doyle, BG (Ret) George Cole; CMSgt (Ret), SES (Ret) Al Buckles.

Bryan York, the Museum Curator, gave a slide presentation on the history of SAC, prior to the speakers recounting their experiences in SAC's glory days.

Guided tours of the Museum and specific aircraft, and other activities for visitors and families completed the full day's agenda.

EC-135 RESTORATION UPDATES

The SAC Museum restoration crew continues to assess the condition of the airframe. Volunteers are sanding the <u>entire exterior</u> of the aircraft. Although the exterior will not be painted until late in restoration, sanding the exterior now exposes areas that need corrosion treatment or sheet metal replacement.

Within the aircraft, the heating/cooling duct, which runs the entire length of the aircraft above the center aisle, is severely corroded. Restoration

manager Mark Hamilton and volunteer Doug Spurlock have done a lot of sheet metal repair on the duct.

Meanwhile, volunteers, including **Dick Doolittle**, have almost finished



sanding the entire cockpit area in preparation for priming and painting. Other volunteers are removing wires, removing wood flooring to assess the airframe under the floor, and removing more of the heating/cooling duct.

All areas of the aircraft show the effect of storing the aircraft outside for many years while awaiting restoration. Volunteer **Hank Carriger** recently removed two large garbage bags of birds' nests and other debris from the non-pressurized tail compartment. Dirt on the bottom of that area was over an inch thick.

This is a long and arduous project requiring dedication and a lot of elbow grease.

BAUMAN, Thomas A., 82, 24 August 2015, Pacific, MO; survived by wife **Beth**. Tom was an Electronic Warfare Officer (EWO) in RB-47s in the **55th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing** at Forbes AFB, KS, circa 1960s.

BROWN, Robert L., 78, 19 April 2016, Sumter, SC; wife of 55 years, **Catherine Mary**. An RC-135 EWO, Bob was on Rivet Ball at

Eielson AFB, AK, 1967-69. After serving as an

assistant professor of English at the USAF Academy, 1973-77, he was the EWO 'ops officer' in the 343rd at Offutt. He originated the *Crewdog Gazette*, a satire of crewmember life in the **55**th.

DONOVAN, Caroline, 73, 6 June 2016, Omaha, NE; former wife of **Dan**, who was the vice commander of the 3902nd ABW at Offutt in the mid-1980s. Caroline was a former school teacher and had an avid interest in antiques.

GILGUT, Dorothy (Dody), 78, 7 May 2013, Ocean Park, ME. She was the widow of Richard (Dick), who was an RC-135 EWO at Kadena AB, Okinawa, and on COMBAT SENT aircraft at Offutt in the late 1960s and into the 1970s.

GUSTAFSON, Carl (Gus), 85, 26 September 2015, Wheaton, IL. Retiring as a SMSgt after 28 years in the AF, Gus was a career maintainer who served in the **55**th at Offutt circa 1970s.

HURD, Peter M., 79, 16 December 2015, Houlton, ME; wife, **Alma Jean**. An EWO, Pete served in RC-135s at Eielson and the **55**th at Offutt, in the mid-1960s. He had a Vietnam tour, 1968-69, and later retired in 1978 from duty in the Office of Undersecretary for Defense, Pentagon, DC. Pete then worked for Det 2, Big Safari, in Houlton.

MATTISON, Enid, 93, 22 February 2016, Fair Oaks, CA. She was the widow of **Mahlon**, an EWO in RBs in the 343rd SRS at Forbes, late 1950s to 1962, when he was transferred to the 4157th SW at Eielson in the original *Office Boy* RC-135D program.

OSBORN, Phillip W., 77, 12 February 2016, Yreka, CA; wife of 53 years, **Janice**. Phil was in the **55**th as an RB-47 navigator at Forbes, then in RCs at Offutt in the 1960s. He was assigned to the 6SW at Eielson in 1970, then to the 307th ARGroup at Travis AFB, CA, where he retired in 1978. During his retirement years, he became an avid gold miner, among other pursuits.

PAUL, Joyce, 12 February 2016, Silver Springs, MD; wife of **Norman**, a long time navigator in the 343rd at Forbes and Offutt, circa 1960s and 1970s.

PIXLEY, John J., 80. 3 March 2016, Omaha, (formerly of La Vista, NE); survived by **Sandra**, they were married 61 years. John was an RC EWO and staff officer in the **55**th at Offutt during the 1970s and early 1980s. His second career was as

Director of Financial Aid and Veterans Affairs at Iowa Western CC in Council Bluffs, IA.

RAFFERTY, Betty, 92, 15 September 2015, Tucson, AZ; widow of **Charles M.** (**Iron Mike**). A legendary SAC B/RB-47 pilot at Forbes in the 1960s, he served in the **55**th as 343rd SRS CC, Deputy CC for Ops, and Deputy CC for Maintenance. He was a charter member of the **Wing** Hall of Fame in 1999. Rafferty passed in November 1967 while on active duty.

RUPP, Edward, 68, 31 May 2016, Rosa Beach, FL; wife **Donna**. Ed served in the **55**th at Offutt as an RC-135 pilot and staff officer in the 1970s. After retiring in 1992, he founded a real estate agency.

SMITH, Rafael (Ray) W., 82, 20 January 2016, Dallas, TX. A pioneer EWO in RB47s at Forbes in 1955, he left the AF in 1958 to pursue a degree in philosophy at Penn State. He later moved to Dallas and started a machine tool company.

SUL, Aristo, 80, 14 February 20**15**, San Antonio, TX; wife, **Virginia**. A retired MSgt, Aristo worked in aircraft maintenance in the **55**th at Offutt circa 1970s. He and Virginia were regular reunion attendees.

TENNANT, Thomas H., 85, 5 March 2016, Bellevue, NE; wife **Margaret**. Chief Tom had near legendary status in the US Electronic Security Service for about 30 years at Yokota AB, Japan, Kadena AB, Okinawa, and at Offutt, among many assignments. He mentored, and was an outstanding role model, for a generation of linguists and other airmen.

"While in the process of raising funds to recapitalize, we have established some very tight financial operating controls that include a special Audit and Finance Committee, independent of the treasurer, and a Bookkeeper and CPA for financial oversight and legal filings, three party approval of all checks written or money movement", wrote Sweeney.
