55th WING HAS A NEW COMMANDER

The **55th Wing** officially welcomed its new commander (Warhawk 01) during a change of command ceremony at Offutt Air Force Base, NE, 22 June 2023.

Colonel Mark Howard accepted the **Wing** guidon from the presiding official, **LtGen Kevin B. Kennedy**, 16th Air Force commander, during the tradition-filled ceremony at the Bennie L. Davis Maintenance Facility.

"When selecting a wing commander, I look for a leader who has demonstrated the ability to build teams, communicate their vision and continually seek a connection with the Airmen who are entrusted to their command, and continually seek greater understanding and deeper insight on the mission they are charged to lead," said LtGen Kennedy. "Colonel Howard is that Airman."

The new Warhawk 01 has spent much of his career serving the *Fightin' Fifty-Fifth*. He is a master RC-135V/W Rivet Joint combat systems officer with more than 2,400 flying hours, including 940 combat and 140 combat support hours.

He has served as the **Wing**'s vice commander since July 2021.

"I am incredibly honored and humbled to serve this elite group of warfighters," Howard said.

"Our new systems require new tactics, techniques and procedures and we are excited and more than ready for that challenge," he continued. "Our courage and resolve will be tested, but we are in this together and we have what it takes." *(Edited by Moore)*



Kennedy awarded outgoing commander, Colonel Kristen Thompson, the Legion of Merit during the ceremony. She led the *Fightin' Fifty-Fifth* through the end of the COVID pandemic, a runway replacement project, and ongoing flood recovery projects, while also establishing an A-Staff and Lead Wing operations simultaneously. She is the first female to lead the Wing.

"Leading a **Wing** of the scale, scope and complexity of the **55th** is no small task," Kennedy said. "Not only did she lead the *Fightin' Fifty-Fifth*, she also ensured the welfare and discipline of the entire Offutt installation. Thanks to your vision and dedication, you empowered your team and elevated them to unprecedented achievements."

Thompson departs the **Wing** for New York where she will serve as a military fellow to the Council on Foreign Relations.

"The sun never sets on this incredible fighting force," she said. "We foster a culture here that captures our Airmen and nation's imagination, our civilian leadership's trust, and our service's brilliance."

"Commanding this **Wing** has been the honor of a lifetime and I'm forever grateful," Thompson concluded.

As the **Wing** transitions to its new leader, Kennedy said our nation is approaching a decisive decade that will set the course of our nation's security for the next century and the Warhawks of the **55th Wing** will play a key role. *(Edited by Moore.)*

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55TH WING'S NEW VICE COMMANDER

Colonel Aaron T. Gray is Warhawk 02, and yet another multitour **55**th'er. This is his third assignment with the *Fightin' Fifty*-

Fifth. He assumed his current position 22 June 2023.

He received his commission in 2002 as a graduate of the ROTC program at Brigham Young University, where he earned an undergraduate degree in Economics.

Colonel Gray was first assigned to the **55**th Electronic Combat Group at Davis-Monthan AFB, AZ, as an instructor pilot in the EC-130H, Compass Call, and as flight commander (October 2005-December 2009).

He then came to Offutt AFB, NE, transitioning to the RC-135, and positions as Deputy Director of the Commander's Action Group, then Wing Executive Officer (October 2010-June 2013).

His previous responsibilities included serving as an expeditionary squadron commander and deputy division chief on the Joint Staff.

Prior to his current assignment, Colonel Gray was Chief, Reconnaissance Operations Division, Deputy Chief of Staff for Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Operations, the Air Staff, Pentagon.



55TH WING UNITS DEMONSTRATE ACE CAPABILITIES WITH EXERCISE IN NORWAY

55th Wing Public Affairs, 9 June 2023

Royal Air Force Mildenhall, England. The 95th Reconnaissance Squadron (RS) and 488th Intelligence Squadron (IS) tested their Agile Combat Employment (ACE) capabilities by deploying an RC-135V/W Rivet Joint aircraft to Ørland Air Station, Norway, as part of Exercise Dagger Fjord, 8-12 May 2023. This was the first Rivet Joint ACE exercise to a NATO country outside the United Kingdom, and demonstrated the unit's ability to rapidly deploy to unfamiliar operating locations.





"Dagger Fjord opened new partnerships and avenues for mission planning and execution, and RC-135 operating locations," said LtCol Jonathan Beha, 95th RS commander.

"We couldn't be more pleased with how things went, and we look forward to building upon this in the future," said **LtCol Bradley Higby**, 488th IS commander.

After launching from RAF Mildenhall, the RJ landed at Ørland and executed three missions before returning to its home station. "To limit the forward deployed footprint, home station staff support was provided remotely from Mildenhall, including mission directors, squadron aviation resource managers, unit-support intel, and a mission planning cell," Higby said.

"Norway was an excellent host nation supporting transportation, lodging, dining and other logistics," Beha said. With the success of this exercise, the 95th RS and 488th IS are now looking to further expand their ACE capabilities.

"Our future ACE exercises and initiatives will focus on furthering the capabilities of operating and maintaining the RC-135 without typical aerospace ground equipment, usage of multi-capable Airmen concepts for security forces and reactive maneuver," Beha said.

"Use of mobile communication suites with more diverse capabilities will further enable RC-135 operations throughout the AOR with little to no support from home station," Higby said.



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TREASURER'S REPORT

As of 12 July 2023, the treasury had an account balance (rounded) of \$29,500. The account is down due to up front monies paid to the reunion hotel. That should be recouped once attendees make reservations and the reunion finances shake out.

A significant portion of the money in the account comes from dues paid in advance. Therefore, we must keep money in reserve for each calendar year to which the dues apply. For example, dues paid for years thru 2026 (or more) are prorated and allocated through the ensuing years. One optimistic member is paid thru 2048!!



Although the **Association** is solvent, we have expenses, obligations, and bills to pay, such as the Birthday Ball, publishing this newsletter, reunion seed money, and projects and donations as they are demeeded appropriate by the Board of Directors.

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The Association is a non-profit IRS 501(C)19 veterans, federal tax exempt organization.

Yes, we are aware that these newsletters tend to be Offutt-centric. It is where stuff happens. Here is how members can help diversify the coverage in Videmus Omnia:



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EC-135C RESTORATION EC-135 #049

After six years and over 34,000 volunteer hours, the interior and exterior restoration of our EC-135 "Looking Glass", #63-8049 was completed and the aircraft has been restored to its former glory (*without wings and engines for floor space saving*) and sits proudly in Hangar B at the Strategic Air Command and Aerospace Museum.

Veteran SAC warriors can visit and remember how 'we' won the Cold War. *Hoo-rah*!!



The following article was written by **Eugene Curtin**, Senior Writer for the Bellevue Leader in its March 7, 2001 issue.

He was moved to write the piece after attending the "Tales of the 55th" gathering at the Offutt Oclub on a Friday evening in February 2001 before the Birthday Ball. It is an emotional tribute to the men and women of the **Fightin' Fifty-Fifth.** It is reprinted here with his gracious permission. Max.



I never considered a military career.

I simply never thought about it, any more than I thought about becoming an oil rigger or a traffic engineer.

Perhaps I would have if someone had suggested it. But no one ever did, and so the idea never occurred to me.

I felt a twinge of regret about that last month when I attended the tribute to the **55th Wing** sponsored by the Association of Old Crows and the **55th SRW Association**.

For 23 years it has been my job to take a seat in the back of the room, shut up and watch. That's basically what we reporters do, or are supposed to do: Observe, and then report on what we see, preferably with some fairness and accuracy. So I took my seat and shut up.

What I saw was a series of retired warriors recount some hair-raising experiences. They were war stories of a familiar kind, seen in countless movies: Airplanes being shot at, adventures in foreign lands, long hours under appalling conditions, lengthy separations from family.

But there was a subtext, one that made me suspect these guys possess something that can't be measured in money or medals, something I'll never own.

Like most subtexts, it's easy to miss. This particular one is probably best described as camaraderie, but a mellow form, far more mellow than its close relative that was much on display the following day during the **Wing**'s 60 year anniversary Birthday Ball at Harvey's Hotel in Council Bluffs. IA.

I noticed it in their greetings and manner of relating to one another. Handshakes were close up, not at arm's length. They patted each other on the back, gently massaging shoulders in a manner that might almost be described as – forgive me, guys – affectionate.

They looked each other in the eye with the ease and comfort of brothers; they refilled each other's glasses, seemed to have little sense of "personal space" when chatting face to face, often whispering jokes and asides into each other's ears.

There was an intimacy there. It was an easy intimacy, too. Generals, colonels, captains and everything in between seemed to mingle freely. I did not sense, among these retired military, any continuing sense of rank. Perhaps my familiarity with their world is too slight to observe such subtleties, but it seemed to my untrained eye a pretty egalitarian gathering, devoid of awkwardness related to higher or lower, exalted or lowly.

To the rest of us, who pursue our careers in the relative stability of a rooted home, an ever-present family, and familiar streets and shopping malls, this intimacy is hard to come by. We have not seen coworkers get their heads blown off by some Vietcong killer. We have not spent months and years away from our kids in a remote desert or jungle, shared a sleeping bag with two other guys splitting 24-hour duty, or had to wear suits protecting us from chemical attack in the sweltering heat of deserts. Certainly, the airplanes in which we travel have never been fired upon.

It's an odd life. You haul your family all over the world, enroll your kids in 10 different schools, live always in a house, never a home. Your natural friends – those with whom you grew up and went through high school – fall by the wayside as you make a series of fleeting friendships in whatever civilian neighborhood you land. The lasting friendships, I imagine, are found in the service.

The gentle spirit of the retired Crows was nowhere present the following night when active-duty members of the **55th Wing** gathered at the grand ballroom of Harvey's Casino for their annual Birthday Ball.

These guys are in the game still. The sense of rank was strong, with adulatory applause directed to the **Wing** commander whose speech was packed with ringing declarations of the **Wing**'s worth and superiority. The wives were all stunning, dressed in strapless gowns that gave testimony to the virility of their warrior husbands.

The stories of these men and women, of course, are still being written, and one could sense they were competing to make them as brilliant as possible. Ladders are still being climbed, favor still being courted, promotions still being sought. Stars or stripes dangle elusively on their horizons.

This I did not envy. It was a world I know too well.

But I know that something more attractive awaits them in retirement.

There they will join organizations and mingle with men and women who know their souls, who know the hells they have endured, who can welcome them with a rub of a shoulder into a fraternity forged by fire.

And people like me will hover around the edges, noticing all this, forever aware that we cannot be where they are, because we have not been where they have been.

(This is a letter I wrote in response to Mr. Curtin's article. It was published March 14th 2001 in the Bellevue Leader. Max.)

Eugene Curtin's piece, "Old Crows Never Die" (March 7), was indeed a stirring and respectful tribute to the personnel who have served, and are serving in, the *Fightin' Fifty-Fifth*. Any reader could tell it was personal, sincere, and heartfelt. Mr. Curtin is to be commended for sharing his feelings with readers of the Leader.

He mentioned the easy camaraderie, the intimacy of fellowship, and, yes - affection among the retired warriors. But that merely scratches the surface of how true and solid the bond is for those kindred troops.

There has been, is, and always will be, the deep feeling of pride of wearing the uniform and serving one's country. Plus, the job satisfaction and sense of duty in spite of sacrifices made.

The 55th has a storied heritage with roots in WWII as the 55th Pursuit Group (1940-41), then as the 55th Reconnaissance Group (1947) in Strategic Air Command. It evolved into the 55th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing, its designation for 42 years, succeeded by the current 55th Wing in 1992.

The unit has always held a singular place in SAC and the US Air Force due to its varied operational missions of national and global significance, through the Cold War and into some hot ones. Even today, it is the largest and busiest wing in Air Combat Command.

It was my distinct privilege to have served in the 55th SRW for 23 years, the last 16 here at Offutt. I know its history and lived much of it with legions of dedicated men and women, many of whom, both locally and across this country, have known each other and stayed connected for 30, 40, even 50 years. They may move away, return, retire here or elsewhere, but it is a unique bonding of memorable experiences in a truly great organization that is the Fightin' Fifty-Fifth which unites us as a proud fraternity.
