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FROM *the* PRESIDENT



Fightin' Fifty-Fifth Faithful, Friends, Family & Followers,

As we power through summer, there seems to be no shortage of activity in the Wing and the Association.

The change-of-command season is now behind us! We bid a fond farewell to Col. Mark “Chili” Howard as he heads to the Pentagon. He will still remain closely associated with the Wing’s missions. Col. Aaron “A-Ron” Gray has taken the helm, with a smooth transition from Deputy Wing Commander. Col. Chad “Magnum” Backes has returned from ACC to serve as Deputy Wing Commander. Col. John “Ballgame” Issaco officiated at seven passings of the flag worldwide, with the second-largest Operations Group in the Air Force continuing to operate seamlessly. As you’ll see in an article in this issue, the MSG and Medical Group also had change-of-command ceremonies, along with several of their subordinate squadrons. One special change saw Lt. Col. Eric “Worm” Armstrong, former 763 RS and 45 RS/DO, take over the 55th Maintenance Squadron—a rare occurrence for a flyer.

The Wing has been busy this spring and summer, participating in several tests and exercises, as well as a first-time large deployment to Australia for Talon Shield (details in the following article). Big Safari’s Greenville, Texas, squadron continues to deliver upgraded airplanes and modify aircraft in the field, ensuring we stay ahead of the latest technologies and targets.

Flood rebuild construction continues at a rapid pace. New facilities for the Security Forces Squadron (Ops, Firing Range, and Kennels) and Logistics Readiness Squadron (Squadron HQ, Fuel Ops, and Logistics Warehouse) are now operational, with the Aircrew Flight Equipment (formerly Life Support) facility set to open in the next few weeks. The final major projects are taking shape. The Satellite Communications facility is nearing completion, with a large steel cage being built to protect against high-altitude electromagnetic pulse. The combined NAOC and Looking Glass alert facility has its alert billet rooms laid out. The Ops Campus is now “weathered in,” meaning the interior work on the 420,000-square-foot facility is no longer affected by weather and will be progressing at full speed, regardless of what this winter may bring.

The board of your association has also been busy establishing new officers and attending to various business matters. You can find the full Board of Directors listing in the following pages, but highlights include Col. (Ret.) “Bo” Marlin as Vice President, Col. (Ret.) Joe “Ex” Spivey as Secretary, Col. (Ret.) Bill Bierbaum as Treasurer, and Lt. Col. (Ret.) Paul “Stick” Miller as Membership Chairman. Col. (Ret.) Michael Cook honored his commitment by staying on as treasurer until the closeout of the Birthday Ball books. We thank Michael tremendously for his long service and dedication to the Board. He has agreed to remain available as an Emeritus Board member to ensure we continue benefiting from his wealth of knowledge.

The Board of Directors is also pursuing larger projects, including moving the 55th Wing Association from Florida to Nebraska and establishing a more robust membership management system, including rosters and dues notices. Planning for the 2026 Birthday Ball has begun, and a “save the date” will be sent out soon after Wing concurrence.

Thank you to all our members who keep the history of this historic Wing alive by sharing stories from the past and staying fully engaged in the present. We have said goodbye to several friends over the past few months, but their accomplishments and memories will live on in our friendship. Thank you for reading through my ramblings, and enjoy the great newsletter that Ryan Hansen has edited and written.

Warhawks welcome new commander



Offutt welcomed the newest commander of the 55th Wing during a change of command ceremony held in the Bennie L. Davis Maintenance Facility, June 17, 2025.

Col. Aaron Gray assumed command from Col Mark Howard in a ceremony officiated by Lt. Gen. Thomas Hensley, commander of the 16th Air Force, Air Forces Cyber, and Joint Force Headquarters-Cyber (Air Force).

“These Warhawks understand the assignment – make both of these crown jewel fleets produce both lethal and life-saving electromagnetic warfare and electromagnetic support effects,” Gray said. “Find bad guys and tell the good guys where they are so we can put ordinance on them fast. And jam the heck out of our adversaries to protect blue forces. We can do it, and we will be ready.”

Gray, former deputy commander of the 55th Wing, brings a lot of experience as the new Warhawk 01. As a command pilot he’s clocked in more than 3,200 flying hours, including 1,600 combat hours.

“Mighty Warhawks, in the last year you have been safely and professionally

meeting the never-ending combatant command requirements, including NORTHCOM and SOUTHCOM and demonstrated that we huge game during large force exercises,” Gray said. “You have been securing the base, keeping the airfield open, keeping our facilities and networks running, fixing the planes and keeping them at historically high mission capable rates, and out thinking the enemy. I am grateful for you, and I promise you that I will give you my all.”

Hensley spoke highly of Gray and his ability to lead the 55th Wing into a new era of executing worldwide intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance, electromagnetic spectrum operations, and nuclear command, control and communications support.

“Officiating the 55th Wing change of command is an honor,” Hensley said. “Col. Howard has led the Warhawks through a period of extraordinary operational tempo, ensuring the wing remained a cornerstone of our Air Force’s ISR and electromagnetic warfare capabilities. As Col. Gray takes the guidon, I have every confidence he will continue to build on that legacy, driving mission excellence and advancing the wing’s critical role in securing our nation and supporting our allies.”

Hensley awarded Howard the Legion of Merit during the ceremony. Howard led the wing during ongoing flood recovery efforts, the addition of new squadron campuses on base, the implementation of the honorary commander program, the acquisition of the final WC-135R Constant Phoenix aircraft, and a highly effective rating for Offutt’s combat readiness inspection – the largest exercise in Offutt’s history, among others.

Howard will depart the wing for the Pentagon, Washington, D.C.

“Serving as the commander of the 55th Wing has been the greatest honor of my career,” Howard said. “Leading this wing has been a privilege I will carry with pride. Col. Gray inherits a wing built on excellence, and I know he will take it to even greater heights.

“Talons out,” Howard closed with.

“Can you see the future? It belongs to those willing to change. There’s a lot more to do, but when has that ever stopped us,” Gray said. “I am honored to be your leader. The next two years are going to be transformative.”

Fightin' Fifty-Fifth participates in Talon Shield

Multinational exercise reinforces global partnerships, future combat readiness

The 55th Wing recently returned from Australia following its participation in Talon Shield, a high-end, multinational training exercise that reinforced the U.S. Air Force's ability to project power, integrate with allies and execute from forward locations.

Held in July as part of Exercise Talisman Sabre, Talon Shield brought together Airmen from the 55th Wing, 319th Reconnaissance Wing and 552nd Air Control Wing for a demonstration of agile operations and combat readiness under the Air Force Force Generation model.

“Talon Shield is a step forward in evolving the U.S. Air Force force generation models to guarantee the service is prepared to conduct the mission anywhere, at any time,” said Col. Aaron Gray, 55th Wing commander. “The exercise strengthens force readiness and the ability to conduct agile, distributed operations as an allied team, as well as the collective ability to keep pace with the rapidly evolving strategic environment.”

Hosted at Royal Australian Air Force Base Edinburgh, Talon Shield emphasized joint and allied integration. The exercise challenged U.S. and Australian forces to organize, deploy and operate under resource-constrained and degraded communications conditions, while supporting distributed ground and airborne command and control and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance missions.

The 55th Wing led the deployment of nearly 200 personnel spanning aircraft maintenance, operations, intelligence, communications, security forces, logistics and personnel support. These teams moved more than 55 tons of cargo, including mission-critical systems and sustainment supplies, in coordination with U.S. Transportation Command, Pacific Air Forces, and Royal Australian Air Force base support teams.

Throughout the exercise, the 55th Wing served under a Strategic Deployable Combat Wing construct, showcasing how smaller, agile units can maintain full mission capability from dispersed locations. Despite the forward deployment, 55th Wing personnel continued managing their regular state-side workload, including oversight of 11 contracts totaling \$2 billion in capacity, with contracting officers assigned to four of them.

“Training shoulder-to-shoulder with allies and partners strengthens interoperability, demonstrates combined resolve and readiness, and upholds regional stability and the rules-based international order that safeguards global peace and prosperity,” Col. Gray said.

The operation highlighted the success of the AFFORGEN model and demonstrated the 55th Wing's ability to integrate with partners, generate combat power from forward locations and contribute to joint force superiority. More than 30,000 personnel from 19 nations participated in Talisman Sabre, making it the largest bilateral military exercise conducted in Australia.

Mission support, medical under new leadership –

Change of commands held at two groups

The 55th Wing welcomed new leadership for two of its six groups in June, as Col. M. Mark Russell took command of the 55th Mission Support Group and Col. Sarah Evans assumed command of the 55th Medical Group during time-honored change of command ceremonies at Offutt Air Force Base.

On June 26, Col. Patrick Kolesiak relinquished command of the 55th MSG to Russell during a ceremony held at the Offutt Fire Station. Kolesiak's tenure was marked by significant achievements, including leading the installation through Air Combat Command's Foundational and Combat Readiness Inspections, earning the highest rating for both, and playing a vital role in Offutt's continued recovery following the historic 2019 flood.

"Col. Kolesiak's impact on the 55th Wing has been nothing short of transformational," said Col. Aaron Gray, 55th Wing commander and presiding official. "He elevated readiness across the enterprise and helped rebuild this base. The Fightin' Fifty-Fifth is stronger because of him."

Russell arrives from the Pentagon, where he served as chief of the Asset Management Division in the Directorate of Civil Engineers at Headquarters Air Force. In that role, he led policy and oversight for Air Force housing, real property and environmental programs across 180 global installations valued at more than \$670 billion.

"We're proud to welcome Col. Russell to the Fightin' Fifty-Fifth," Gray said. "He inherits an exceptional team and is well-equipped to lead it to even greater heights."

Two days earlier, on June 24, Col. Bozung passed command of the 55th Medical Group to Evans, who previously led the 82nd Medical Group at Sheppard AFB, Texas. The 55th MDG supports more than 49,000 Department of Defense beneficiaries in the Omaha area, including members of the 55th Wing, U.S. Strategic Command and the 557th Weather Wing.

"I could not be prouder of the 55th 'Mighty Medics,'" Bozung said. "They overcame resource limitations and executed the mission with resilience and dedication. We made significant improvements and remained fully committed to trusted care."

Evans emphasized readiness and resilience as central to her command philosophy.

"Stay ready so you don't have to get ready," Evans said. "Readiness is not just a checkbox—it's a culture, a mindset, and a responsibility we owe to each other and the warfighters who depend on us."

Kolesiak departs to lead Air Force ROTC Detachment 645 at The Ohio State University, where he will shape the next generation of Air Force and Space Force officers. Bozung's next assignment was not publicly announced at the time of publication.

EA-37B completes first training sortie

The 43rd Electronic Combat Squadron flew the first EA-37B mission training sortie at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Arizona, May 2, 2025.

The EA-37B, a wide-area airborne electromagnetic attack weapon system using a heavily modified version of the Gulfstream G550 airframe, will replace the legacy EC-130H as a more modern, and cost-effective, commercial derivative aircraft. Ten of 14 EC-130H aircraft have been divested to date.

“The EA-37B...represents the most recent evolution in a long history of EMS dominance for the 55th Electronic Combat Group,” said Lt. Col. Jesse Szwed, 43rd ECS director of operations. “The capabilities of this platform are the cornerstone to addressing emerging threats in any AOR at any time.”

The EA-37B sustains joint force military advantage in electromagnetic battlespace and builds a more lethal force by modernizing electromagnetic attack capabilities to deny peer competitors’ tactical networks and information ecosystems.

Additionally, the aircraft denies, degrades and disrupts adversary communications, information processing, navigation, radar systems and radio-controlled threats. It also employs offensive counter-information and electromagnetic attack capabilities in support of U.S. and coalition tactical air, surface and special operations forces.

“This EA-37B mission culminates years of planning and coordination between thousands of people spanning

many organizations,” said Lt. Col. Tray Wood, 43rd ECS commander. “The hard work and dedication of these groups ensure the 55th ECG is prepared for future conflict with the 43d ECS leading developments in the electromagnetic spectrum.”

The first EA-37B was delivered to the 55th ECG on August 23, 2024, with a total of ten EA-37B’s are expected to be produced and assigned to the group.

Royal Air Force pilot awarded U.S. Air Medal

A Royal Air Force member assigned to the 343rd Reconnaissance Squadron was presented the U.S. Air Medal at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska, June 6, 2025.

While at 379th Expeditionary Wing, AL Udeid Air Force Base, Qatar, Flt. Lt. Tom Keable, 343rd RS evaluator pilot, was pivotal in the collection and distribution of critical, time sensitive intelligence that brought awareness to battlefield commanders, strike aircraft, and grounded combat forces.

“I am honored to receive this award because it draws wider attention to the achievements of my crew and recognizes our success as a team,” Keable said.

In 2014, Keable joined the RAF. In 2018, he finished RC-135 initial qualifi-

cation with the 338th Combat Training Squadron and flew the UK Rivet Joint with 51 Squadron until 2022. Flt. Lt. Keable has flown nearly 1,500 hours in the RC-135.

Keable is a part of the Military Person-

nel Exchange Program and the MPEP help facilitates a one for one exchange of military personnel between the U.S. and allied nations.

“Flt. Lt. Keable earning the U.S. Air Medal reinforces across our crew force how our U.K. and U.S. Rivet Joint crews are mutually supportive,” said Lt. Col. Robert Smith, 343 RS commander. “Our crews recognize his professionalism and aviation skill within the squadron, Flt. Lt. Keable’s well-earned decoration represents that more officially.

“It’s a great point of pride having Flt Lt Keable seamlessly integrated into the 343d, and a reminder of how important it is to train and operate with our allies,” he added. “The Ravens are lucky to have Flt. Lt. Keable as part of our team.”

This year's guest speaker was Dr. Franklin Damann, Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency Offutt Laboratory director. In addition to delivering keynote remarks, Damann also led a tour of the DPAA facility for attendees of the 2025 Recon Rendezvous earlier in the year.

Offutt law center renamed to honor SAC legacy

The Offutt Law Center was officially renamed the Strategic Air Command Heritage Law Center during a May 1 ceremony at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska.

Originally constructed during World War II as Building A for the Glenn L. Martin Company, the facility later housed Strategic Air Command headquarters from 1948 until SAC moved to Building 500 in 1957.

“I was proud to help cut the ribbon and reconnect the building to its historical roots,” said Lt. Col. John Reid, 55th Wing staff judge advocate. “Even more exciting is our new partnership with the SAC Museum, which provided historical artifacts to help bring our heritage to life.”

The renovation project began in July 2023 and concluded on the day of the renaming. Updates included repairs, fresh paint throughout the interior, and the addition of a garden.

Thanks to artifact loans from the SAC Museum and significant in-house labor, the total cost remained under \$10,000.

“We wanted to present a professional image and honor the legacy of SAC,” Reid said.

TAPS

BOWKER, William R., 100 – Died Jan. 30, 2025, in Milwaukie, Oregon. He was married to his late wife, **Jean**, for 74 years. Commissioned in 1944, he became a pilot and later served in the Air Force Reserve. Recalled for service during the Korean War in 1954, he spent two years in Japan training Air Force pilots. In 1957, he was assigned to the 55th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing at Forbes Air Force Base, Kansas, as an RB-47 aircraft commander. After retiring to Oregon in 1967, he worked as a corporate pilot. He and Jean enjoyed traveling the country in their Airstream.

BARBOUR, Diane E., 89 – Died May 11, 2025, in South Haven, Michigan. Widow of **Frank Barbour**, a career NCO who passed away last year, she and Frank were married for 68 years. Diane was a longtime resident of Bellevue, Nebraska, and worked for 13 years as a court administrator in the Sarpy County Justice System.

HARRIS, Thomas E., 86 – Died May 12, 2025, in Spring Hill, Florida. He was married to his wife, **Betty**, for more than 60 years. After commissioning through OTS, Tom served as an EWO in RB-47s with the 55th SRW at Forbes AFB, Kansas, in the 1960s, followed by assignments with the 82nd SRS at Kadena AB, Okinawa, and later at Offutt. After retirement, he worked for NASA and Houston Light and Power.

KNECHT, Ronald J., 87 – Died July 9, 2025, in Nokesville, Virginia. An EWO in RBs at Forbes AFB, Ron continued flying in RCs with the 55th at Offutt, then transferred to Eielson AFB, Alaska, in the 6th SRW. He later served at SAC HQ and the Pentagon and became a GS civilian in the Office of the Secretary of Defense. He also worked for SAIC following his government service.

LEWIS, William E., 97 – Died August 21, 2021, in Kerrville, Texas. A WWII veteran bombardier/navigator, he flew B-17s in Europe and B-29s in the Pacific. He served as a respected 343rd IN and squadron navigator in RB-47s at Forbes in the 1960s, later supporting U-2 and SR-71 planning at SAC SRC, and then the 15th Air Force. He retired in June 1970 as a colonel after 36 years of service. In retirement, he founded a golf equipment and driving range business in Kerrville, which he sold in 1998.

LEWIS, Helen Louise “Lou”, 94 – Died December 24, 2019, in Kerrville, Texas. Lou was married to **Bill Lewis** at Davis-Monthan AFB, Arizona, in 1952, and they were together for 67 years. She was a devoted military wife and mother, active in church, Officers’ Wives Clubs, and community groups at every duty station.

PARENTE, Michael, 87 – Died May 30, 2025, in Bellevue, Nebraska. Chief Parente served as the Senior Enlisted Advisor of the 3902nd Air Base Wing at Offutt and later as Command Chief of the 55th SRW, retiring in 1990 after 33 years of service. Known as a “Chief’s Chief,” he also served as International President of the Air Force Sergeants Association. In retirement, he taught JROTC at Bellevue East High School and managed the Knights of Columbus Hall.



SAENZ, Roland, 89 – Died April 12, 2025, in Bellevue, Nebraska. He was married to **Kathy** for 64 years. Roland was a career navigator who began flying RB-47s with the 55th at Forbes in the 1960s and later transitioned to RCs at Kadena and Offutt. He later became a successful entrepreneur in Bellevue.

SCUDERI, Margaret J. “Peg”, – Died July 6, 2024, in Centerville, Georgia. Peg was the widow of **Rich Scuderi**, an RC-135 EWO and later part of SRC at Offutt and Warner Robins, who died in 2001. Married for 61 years, Peg was a dedicated military wife and mother who also worked as a realtor and administrative assistant at Warner Robins AFB.

SNEED, C. Daniel, – Died June 16, 2025, in Omaha, Nebraska. Dan began his Air Force service as a Russian linguist, later commissioning through ROTC after attending the University of Kentucky. He flew in the 38th SRS and 1st ACCS at Offutt in the early 1980s, and then with NATO AWACS in Germany before separating in 1987.

WARD, Judith, 85 – Died December 16, 2024, in Nevada City, California. She was married to **Patrick Ward** for 66 years. Pat served as a navigator in RCs at Kadena in the late 1960s and early 1970s and later with the 55th at Offutt. A Pennsylvania native and Penn State graduate, Judy taught preschool and later entered federal service with the USGS Water Resources Division, retiring in 1997.

YATES, Paul R. “Rick”, 69 – Died May 13, 2025, in The Villages, Florida. He was married to **Dixie** for 24 years. Rick served as an Army infantryman before earning a commission in the Air Force. After navigator training, he was assigned to the 2nd ACCS and 38th SRS at Offutt, followed by tours at Eielson and Barksdale, and returned to Offutt with the 1st ACCS. After retiring from active duty, he worked for 29 more years as an analyst and logistics planner at PACAF and Scott AFB.
